Ballot Boxes Robbed and Counterfeit Ballots Inserted.

Mr. Davin Gets a Seat Through Marks of Returning Officers.

Whitby, July 13 .- Sensational developments characterized the North Ontario recount, concluded here on Saturday. In five polling subdivisions there were found with Warden Duncan Graham's ballots 21 ballots marked for Mr. McGillivray. These fraudulent ballots had been substitued for ones that had been counted for Mr. Graham on election night by the different deputies and certified to by the scrutineers representing the two candidates. They were found as follows: Polling subdivision 4, 2 ballots; No. 18, 3; No. 27, 5, and No. 33, 6. None of them were initialed, and, though beautifully marked with crosses in the disk opposite Major McGillivray's name, the precaution of folding them up first before placing them with the genuine ballots had been overlooked, so that they were without a crease, and could never have passed through the slots into the ballot boxes. The total vote cast was 4,714, of which 2,344 were decided by Judge Burnham to be for Mr. McGillivray, and 2,334 for Mr. Graham, with 36, including the 21 fraudulent ones, rejected, so that Mr. McGillivray holds the seat until he carries out the intention of resigning it, which Judge Burnham told the Globe correspondent Mr. McGillivray expressed during the recount, when the facts as to the fraudulent ballots became clear, and also that when Mr. D'Alton McCarthy, who appeared for Mr. Graham, announced that the election would be protested, Mr. McGillivray stated that he would not become the defendant in such an action. Judge Burnham allowed ballots with crosses in the oblong space, also when marked in any other way to clearly indicate the voter's intention. Although in his written finding in the recount Judge Burnham simply states the fraudulent ballots were found with Mr. Graham's, and that they were not initialed, in conversation with the Globe correspondent he freely discussed the matter and expressed his abhorrence of such a crime. As the aggravating details of the recount became public, the feeling, irrespective of political sentiments, is very strong here that so bold and

reckless an attempt to tamper with the ballot papers, as is clearly evident has been done in the case of the North Ontario election between the date of the official count, July 6, and Friday, ought to be thoroughly investigated, and the guilty persons pun-In his decision the judge rejected the

dshed. twenty-one ballots which had been substituted for the twenty-one stolen from the Graham package. This left Mr. McGillivray's honest vote 2,344, but, as twenty-one of Mr. Graham's ballots had been stolen, his total was left at 2,334. Adding these twenty-one stolen ballots, Mr. Graham would have a majority of eleven.

DYMENT'S BIG MAJORITY.

Sault Ste. Marie, July 13 .- The returning officer declares A. E. Dyment (Liberal) elected in Algoma by a majority of 1,820. CANNOT STAND.

Winnipeg, July 13 .- Judge Richardson on Friday declared Mr. Davin elected for West Assiniboia. He threw out two McInnis votes, because they had been numbered by the deputy returning officer. This brought the count out a tie, and the returning officer gave a casting vote for Davin.
There is considerable feeling at Regina over the matter and \$600 was subscribed freely by the mayor and other citizens to go on with the protest.

Mr. Macdonnell, the Liberal member for Selkirk, is confirmed in his seat, the Conservative application for a recount having fallen through on account of the necessary fees being paid to the wrong court officer.
