

PEAT OF A BLIND BICYCLIST. A blind boy bicyclist of Oakland, Cal., performed a remarkable feat a week or so since by riding from Oak land to San Jose on his bicycle and back again, a "century run" along the highway, guided only by the sound of the bell on the bicycle of a friend who accompanied him. He has been stone blind for fourteen years. His name is N. L. Perry, and he is now about 17 years old. He was a student in the Berkeley Institute for the Deaf and Dumb and Blind, and while there was the leader in field sports and in the gymnasium. He graduated with honors, and is now a student in the State University. His loss of sight is compensated for in some degree by an abnormal sense of hearing.

When all the young men of his acquaintance began to ride the bicycle he became greatly interested in the machine and determined to own and ride one himself. He was confident that if he could once learn to mount and pedal and dismount, his sense of hearing would enable tim to ride with perfect safety and with great enjoyment. His first lesson proved a very trying experience, and he had one serious fall.
