Verdict of the Coroner's Jury in the

Case of Engineer O'Hagan's

At the adjourned inquest into the

cause of the death of Engineer John P. O'Hagan, which occurred on the morning of the 2nd inst, about three miles west of Strathroy, the jury de-liberated for two hours and rendered the following verdict: "That John Patrick O'Hagan, engineer of the freight train No. 96, came to his death by a rear-end collision between freight No 96 and No 4 Lehigh express, going east on the Sarnia branch of the Grand Trunk Railway about three miles west of the town of Strathroy at 3:30 a.m., on Thursday, Sept. 2, 1897. We find the engine of No. 4 became disabled by stripping the threads off the valve stem, causing a delay of 33 minutes, so that No. 96, which left Wyoming at 2:42 a.m-eleven minutes after the express-came into collision with the rear end of said train at the point mention And we also find that Brakeman Edward Wilson greatly underestimated the distance that he should have traveled in placing the fog signals on the rails, and was negligent in the discharge of his duty. We also find that William'S. Wilson, train dispatcher at London, violated the rules of the G. T. R. in allowing train No. 96 to pass Kingscourt before No. 4 had been re-ported as having left Strathroy.
