British High Commissioner in South Africa.

British Cabinet Summoned to Meet on Friday.

a Grave Mistake In Taking Upon Themselves the

The Boers Believed to Have Made

Onus of Declaring War.

Late Reports State That They Have Not Waited for the Time Limit, but Have Crossed the Border.

MINISTER MILNER'S STATEMENT. London, Oct. 10 .- Late this afternoon the colonial office gave out the text of the following telegram, transmitted by Sir Alfred Milner, British high commissioner in South Africa, to the secretary of state for the colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, and received at 6:45 a.m. today:

"Sir,-The government of the South African Republic feels itself compelled to refer the government of her Majesty Queen of Great Britain and Ireland once more to the convention of London, 1884, concluded between this republic and the United Kingdom, and which, in Article XIV., secures certain specified rights to the white population of this republic, namely:

OUTLANDERS' RIGHTS.

"That all persons other than natives, on conforming themselves to the laws of the South African Republic (a) will have full liberty, with their families, to enter, travel or reside in any part of the South African Re-public; (b) they will be entitled to hire or possess houses, manufacturing warehouses, shops and other premises; (c) they may carry on their commerce either in person or by any agent or agents whom they may think fit to employ; (d) they shall not posed upon the citizens of the said republic.'

observe that the above are the only rights which her Majesty's Government have reserved in the control of that the British Covernment have reserved in the control of the c ment have reserved in the above convention with regard to the outlander population of this republic, and the violation only of those rights could give that government a right to diplomatic representations or intervention; while, moreover, the regulation of all other questions affecting the position of the rights of the outlander population, under the above-mentioned con-vention, is handed over to the government and representatives of the people of the South African Republic.

THE FRANCHISE.

'Among the questions, the regulation of which falls exclusively within the competence of the government and of the volksraad, are included those of franchise and the representation of the people in this republic; and although the exclusive right of this government and of the volksraad for the regulation of the franchise and representation of the people is indisputable, yet this government has found occasion to discuss, in friendly fashion, the franchise and representation of the people with her Majesty's Government, without, however, any right thereto on the part of her Majesty's Government.

A COMPLAINT. "The government has also, by the

formulation of the now existing franchise law, and by a resolution with regard to the representation, constantly held these friendly discussions before its eyes. On the part of her Majesty's Government, however, the friendly nature of these discussions has assumed more and more a threatening tone; and the minds of the people of this republic and the people of South Africa have been excited and a condition of extreme tension has been created owing to the fact that her Majesty's Government could no longer agree to the legislation respecting the franchise and the resolution respecting representation in this republic, and, finally, by your note of Sept. 25, 1899, which broke off all friendly correspondence on the subject, and intimated that her Majesty's Government must now proceed to formulate their own proposals for the final settlement.

THE CONVENTION OF LONDON. "This government can only see in the above intimation from Majesty's Government a new violation of the convention of London, 1884, which does not reserve to her Majesty's Government the right to an unilateral settlement of a question which is exclusively a domestic one for this government, and which has already been

A STRAINED SITUATION. "On account of the strained situation and the consequent serious loss in and interruption of trade in gen-eral, which the correspondence respecting franchise and the representation of the people of this republic has car-ried in its train. Her Majesty's Government have recently pressed for an early settlement, and finally, pressed by your intervention for an answer within 48 hours, a demand subsequently somewhat modified, to your note of Sept. 15 and to your note of Sept. 25, 1899; and thereafter further friendly negotiations were broken off, this government receiving an intimation that a proposal for a final settlement would

A MENACE.

"Having regard to occurrences in the history of this republic, which it is unnecessary here to call to mind, this republic felt obliged to this military force in the neighbor-hood of its borders as a threat against the independence of the South African Republic, since it was aware of no circumstance which would justify the presence of such a military force in South Africa and in the neighborhood of its borders.

AN ALLEGED DEFENSIVE MEA-

SURE.

"In an answer to an inquiry with respect thereto, addressed to his excellency the high commissioner, this government received, to its great astonishment, in answer, a veiled insinuation that from the side of the republic an attack was being made on her Majesty's colonies, and at the same time, a mysterious reference to possibilities, whereby the government was strengthened in its suspicion that the independence of this republic was being threatened.

"As a defensive measure, this government was therefore obliged to send a portion of the burghers of this republic in order to offer requisite resistance to similar possibilities."

A CABINET COUNCIL. London, Wednesday, Oct. 11. — The cabinet has been summoned to meet at the foreign office on Friday next. The ultimatum of the Transvaal Government is naturally the absorbing topic of conversation at the clubs and in political circles. There is a general feeling that the Boers have made a mistake, as their forcing matters will tend to alienate the sympathy which might have been extended to them had they thrown the stigma

of declaring war on Great Britain. BAD FOR THE BOERS.

The text of the Boer ultimatum on arriving was sent with all speed to Lord Salisbury, who came to town in the afternoon, and a dispatch box was sent to the Prince of Wales, which is only done in cases of special urgency. LITTLE TIME LEFT.

The Boers have constructed forts commanding Laing's Neck, and guns have been mounted on Mounts Pogwane and Prospekt. Advices from Pretoria state that

tremendous excitement has been caused there by the news that the Queen has called out the reserves. The Boers are clamoring for war.

PREPARATIONS.

War preparations by Great Britain are being pushed with the greatest energy. The Woolwich arsenal has already forwarded to South Africa over 3,000,000 cartridges for rifles and machine guns, and the reserves continue to respond easily to the mobilization proclamation.

AGAINST THE BOERS

Although all preparations have been made for defense, however, the excitement increases. It was aggravated by a report that the wires had been cut. This, as it turned out, was done by the fighting top of an armored train which the train guards had forgotten to lower. The telegraph staff had hard work to restore communication, but this was accomplished early this morning. Gen. Cronje' force, estimated at 4,000 men-is known to be in readiness.

AT BULUWAYO.
