WATERLOO WON TROPHY.

Waterloo, Ont., March 22.—The Waterloo Intermediate hockey team won the twin-city championship and the handsome trophy last night. DOUBLE TRAGEDY.

Passaic, N. J., March 22.—Mrs. Annie Lukas drowned herself and her infant daughter in the Passaic River yesterday. Mrs. Lukas' husband died a year ago, and it is believed the hard struggle she had to support herself and five children affected her mind.

BABY BOY FATALLY SCALDED.

Hamilton, March 22.—Stanley James Thatcher, the 13-months old son of Geo. Thatcher, 11 Aurora street, fell into a pail of scalding water Thursday and was so seriously scalded that he died from his injuries in the evening. The child's sister placed the pail of water on the floor in the kitchen. Her baby brother, aged about 13 months, was toddling about the room, when the door was suddenly opened by another of the children, knocking the baby into the pail of boiling water. The child was most dreadfully scalded from the shoulders to knees and lived in frightful agony until about 10 o'clock.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

Boston, Mass., March 22.—Mrs. Julia B. French, a wealthy, eccentric and famous throughout the country because of her many and varied law suits, was found dead in her Back Bay residence yesterday. Her body lay on top of an elevator. Medical Examiner Draper reported that her death was due to an accident. She was 70 years of age.

DROWNED.

Port Hope, Ont., March 22.—Yesterday Edward Hughes, while looking along the lake shore, discovered the body of a man washed up opposite Port Britain. It was at first thought to be the body of Wm. Douglas, who was drowned here on Wednesday, March 12, but on being brought into town it proved to be the body of an unknown man, apparently about 40 years of age, and 5 feet 10 inches in height. The body was quite nude, every thread of clothing being missing, with the exception of a pair of galley boots, with heavy half-soles. The body evidently had been in the water a long time.

FOUND DEAD IN BED.

Cobourg, Ont., March 21.—Dorlane Smith, proprietor of the Columbian and Baltimore Hotels, was found dead in his bed this morning. Mr. Smith was about yesterday and appeared to enjoy good health. He was about 55 years of age, and married, but had no family.

NO NEWS OF HURONIA.

St. Johns, Nfld., March 22.—Incoming shipping brought no news of the Allan liner Huronia (Capt. Biddle) from Glasgow, Feb. 11, for St. Johns, about one month overdue. It is generally believed in marine circles that she foundered in the ice in the North Atlantic. There is a bare possibility that she has been caught in ice and is being slowly crushed, as happened in the case of another steamship a few years ago.

JEALOUSY AND MURDER.

New York, N. Y., March 22.—Joseph Liebenberg, 70 years of age, shot and killed his daughter, a 21-year-old girl, Anna Liebenberg, and then shot and killed himself. He complained recently that the young woman had been unfaithful to him, and he had been accused by some sealing steamer, as happened in the case of another steamship a few years ago.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.

Montreal, March 22.—Adam Kerr, representing A. S. Richardson & Co., of Toronto, attempted to kill himself by shooting yesterday afternoon. His condition is dangerous.

HAD 725 PUPILS DURING THE YEAR

Good Showing for the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph.

Toronto, March 22.—The report of the Ontario Agricultural College for the year 1901 has just been printed for distribution. The total number of students registered for work at the college was 281 in the general course and 22 specialists, less two registered in both general and dairy courses, making a total of 381 in these courses. The three short courses (stock judging, poultry raising and domestic science), numbering 344, added to the foregoing, would make a total of 725 who registered for work at the college within the twelve months ending Feb. 15, 1902. The students in the short courses were nearly all from the province, and of those in the general and dairy courses, including 22 specialists, 235, or a little over 82 per cent (nearly all farmers' sons) were from Ontario, 23 from other provinces of the Dominion, and 35 from other countries.

BRED BY QUEEN VICTORIA.

Kansas City, March 22.—Fancy prices were realized at the first day's dispersion sale of W. R. Nelson's herd of thoroughbred Shorthorn cattle. Fifty-seven lots were offered, including imported animals bred by the late Queen of England, Dan R. Hanna, son of Senator Mark Hanna, bought by Lavender Lilly (imp.), calf at side, for \$1,500; Miranda (imp.), calf at side, for \$1,500; Majesty (imp.), calf at side, for \$1,500; and Village Bell (imp.), bull calf at side, also bred by the Queen, \$1,500; F. Marsters, of Brooklyn, bought Diana (imp.), calf at side, for \$700.

MARCONI AT WORK.

Sydney, N. S., March 22.—Marconi arrived here from Ottawa to select the site for his wireless station, which is likely to be Tablehead, Glace Bay. Marconi was met by a great crowd, including about 500 Italians, who are employed at the steel works. They organized a torchlight procession and drew the inventor to his hotel.

WILD PRANKS OF 74-MILE GALE

Which Visited New York on Wednesday.

It Topped People Over, Upset Wagons and Unroofed Many Houses.

New York, March 21.—One thousand miles of wind in 24 hours was Boreas' record on Wednesday.

Between midnight and midnight the wind averaged close to 50 miles an hour, and at 2:30 in the morning it was spinning the anemometers around so fast that the dials registered 74 miles an hour. Its force abated after midnight, but at midnight it was whipping out 38 miles each 50 minutes.

A piece of paper traveling with this gale would have been blown beyond Chicago in 24 hours. The railroad train could have kept up the pace.

With the gale came occasional flurries of snow. It was a sharp, fine snow, that bit the faces of wayfarers, and then whirled away. By dusk the wind had swept the streets much cleaner of snow than Major Woodbury's men could have done.

A knife-like gust caught the tin roof of the Grand street "L" station, on the downtown Bowery side, and rolled it up like a sheet of paper under the wind. It was blown far into the air and disappeared. Nobody was hurt, though several pedestrians had narrow escapes from flying tin.

A horse and wagon were upset in Park Row by the sweep of the gale, and the animal, seeking shelter, hid behind the wagon. The driver righted his rig again and induced the bewildered nag to make a dash for the less exposed part of the street above the Brooklyn bridge.

While the wind was blowing its hardest, during the afternoon the paint shop on the Bellevue Hospital grounds was blown down from the third story of a skyscraper, and its flight to the pavement, carrying a great deal of debris, was a sight to behold.

Down in the financial district the wind was the fiercest of all, sweeping through the canyons made by the skyscrapers. It knocked Mrs. Mary Shampay, of No. 58 Clinton avenue, off her feet. Her husband, the curb and her scalp was severely cut.

It was hard for the curb brokers to keep their feet in broad street during the storm. The proportion of 48 per cent business had to be suspended because the brokers had to take refuge in doorways.

"The reason for all this," said Forecaster Emery is that New York finds itself on the extreme edge of a storm which is hurrying New England. It began in the Gulf of Mexico, and struck our upper coast. Then the high pressure and low pressure areas met and this caused the high winds. It came to moderate much by tomorrow."

Storm signals were set all along the Atlantic coast, from Wilmington to New York.

Shipping had a hard time of it. Vessels riding at anchor off Liberty Island dragged their anchors. The five-master schooner Governor was drifted rapidly down on Governor's Island. Finally her anchor fouled the Commercial Cable Company's cable, and there she lay, stuck fast, for several hours.

Regulating the fall of 20 per cent in the price of copper, the mineral production of the province showed an increase of 25 per cent over the previous year. The output of the chief metals being as follows: Gold, \$5,600,000; silver, \$2,600,000; copper, \$5,000,000; lead, \$2,000,000; and coal, \$4,500,000.

The 66th yearly general meeting of this bank was held on Tuesday at the office of the corporation, No. 5 Grace Church street, E.C., Mr. E. A. Hoare presiding.

The chairman said: Before reading the report, which I have prepared respecting the business of the bank during the year 1901, I desire to welcome you to our new premises. When we last met a year ago in Clement's Lane, I had the pleasure of showing these new offices to some of you who were then present. We have secured a long lease of the premises, and in the year 1903, so that the present generation of shareholders and directors need not fear any further disturbance in their time.

I will now proceed to make some comments upon the report and accounts for the half-year ended Dec. 31, 1901, and for the purpose of comparison I will take the figures of the corresponding half-year in 1900. The reserve fund at the end of 1900 stood at £250,000. We have now added to it £15,000, and the total reserve fund is now £265,000. Deposits and current accounts show an increase of £27,000, notes in circulation an increase of £3,000. Bills payable have decreased by £1,000, and the total liabilities are now £2,659,971 4 2.

Following three appropriations for the benefit of the staff, which I am confident will be fully appreciated by the staff, as usual, meet with your generous approval. On the other side of the account the cash and specie have decreased by £37,000, while on the other hand, cash at call and short notice shows an increase of £238,000. Here I may point out that the cash at call and short notice is not a permanent asset, as it is subject to withdrawal at any time.

Proceeding northwards to Dawson City, it will interest you to know that we have done a considerable business in the export of gold, and that our general banking business is satisfactory. The government estimate of the amount of gold shipped from Dawson during the year is £23,000,000, but our Dawson City manager, who is now at home, informs me that he thinks these figures exceed the actual total, and that there has been an inaccuracy in the figures issued by the government. That, however, is not important to us now; we are not so much concerned with the amount of gold that has been brought out as we are with the amount which is left in, and upon which alone the future prosperity of Dawson City depends. As to the future life of the gold fields, I notice that the opinions of experts who have visited the place and made their observations on the spot differ widely, and you will not, therefore, expect any opinion at all from me. I will only say this, that we do not expect to see any increase in the output, and that if the exports of gold continue upon the present scale we shall be content.

The chairman moved the adoption of the report, adding that he would be happy to reply to the best of his ability to any inquiries which they may wish to put to him.

Mr. Henry R. Farrar seconded the motion, which was then put and carried unanimously.

The retiring directors—Messrs. F. Lubbock, H. R. Farrar, and E. A. Hoare—were unanimously re-elected, and Mr. Edwin Waterhouse and Mr. George Sneath were reappointed auditors.

An extraordinary general meeting was then held. Mr. Hoare again presiding, at which Mr. Maurice Glyn was elected a director.
