SURVEYORS ARE NOW AT WORK
ON POWER LINE TO LONDON

Making Their Way Eastward
From This City—Rapid Progress Being Made.

A party of engineers in charge of Mr. John MacCunn of New York, have begun the work of surveying eastward from this city for the transmission lines of the Niagara-Wendell Power Company, which proposes to sell Niagara power in London and elsewhere between this city and the falls. The engineers chartered automobiles here and are using them on the survey. Another party is working westward from Brantford, and it is hoped that the survey will be completed within a few weeks.

Speaking of the company to a reporter today, Mr. MacCunn said that it is the intention for the present to develop 10,000 horse-power, although the original plans which were filed in Ottawa in 1897, and afterwards approved of by the Governor in Council in 1901, show right of way sufficient for a canal of ultimate capacity of 300,000 horse-power. Regarding the extension in the future to this capacity, he may be stated that the charter of the company is of the most sweeping description, and it is not intended to limit upon the amount of water which may be taken, except to stipulate that navigation must not be interfered with, and the next clause, however, gives power to dredge, deepen, or alter the Welland River to any extent to which it may be necessary to furnish the water. In order to carry this scheme during the first few years, and to form the nucleus of a future railway, which will be of immense value to the company, the company is at present surveying a right of way for transmission lines from their power house, four miles east of St. Catharines, to different points in a territory which may be bounded by Toronto, Brampton, Milton, Guelph, Stratford, St. Marys, London and Niagara Falls. The surveying is being rapidly pushed ahead, and in this connection it is of interest to note that the location of the power house is being chosen with the view of utilizing the right of way for the construction of a railway, which will be of immense value to the agricultural, industrial and commercial interests in the districts to be traversed.

GRANT INCREASED
TWO CENTS A DAY
CIVIC IMPROVEMENT
SOCIETY DID GOOD

Ontario Government Will Make
20 Cents Allowance for
Public Patients.

The hospital trust was occupied for fully two hours yesterday in consideration of a number of important matters. Mr. James Mattinson, the new member of the board, was present for the first time.

Six tenders for the coal supply, of which four were from city dealers and two from outside merchants, were received. There was quite a difference in the prices, but before taking action the board called the hospital engineer, Mr. Harding, who in most emphatic terms told the members that to give the tender to one of the firms, which had provided the supply for several years, would be next to madness. Their coal had been almost useless, and instead of it had to be taken back. He thought that rather than run this risk again, it would be better to pay a better price and secure the supply from a reliable firm. Mr. Harding strongly recommended the coal which had been secured last year, but on one variety this year's was considerably above the others.

As the matter stood, nothing could be done. No one would make a motion, and so it was decided to lay the matter over for two weeks, when it will be seen if anything can be done to relieve the difficulty.

At the last meeting the matter of securing estimates on the cost of furnishing the Nurses' Home was left in the hands of the chairman and Superintendent. The statement which they prepared showed that with \$2,600 the important furnishings and fittings in the place, and this will leave about \$300 for extras. The rooms will be nicely fitted up and every comfort is assured for the nurses. A piano may be installed. Miss Mayum made a number of suggestions to the board in regard to the new home.

The date of the opening of the home will be May 24, and every effort will be made to secure Earl and Lady Grey for the occasion. One letter has been received from her excellency, in which he stated that if at all possible he would be present and take part in the opening ceremonies.

Superintendent Heard announced that the Ontario Government has agreed to give a grant of 20 cents per day towards each public patient, which will be an increase of 2 cents over the former grant.

Nine applications for the position of junior house surgeon were received, and Drs. Fred C. Ellis, Wm. M. Shoemaker and L. G. Rowntree were appointed. They will commence their duties soon, and will continue on the staff for a year.

The statement of the superintendent for the month showed 130 patients admitted and 134 discharged. At present there are 110 under treatment. The cash receipts were \$1,675 75.

The late Miss Goulding was a general favorite at the hospital here, and her death is deeply regretted by a large circle of friends.
