

PIEST REFUSED TO GIVE ANSWER

A Sensation Sprung in Murder Case By Priest's Refusal To Give Information.

Quebec, Ont., April 24.—The trial of Omer Rochette for the murder of his wife, which has been proceeding quietly in this city for the past few days, assumed a somewhat sensational aspect this morning, when a Dominican priest, the Rev. Mr. Aubert, who married the accused twelve days after the death of his first wife, absolutely refused, despite the ruling of the presiding judge to give his reason for having performed the ceremony without the announcement of the bans, according to custom.

The crown prosecutor insisted upon the clergyman responding, as he maintained that the reasons given by the accused could not be held as a professional secret by the priest, and the crown prosecutor was sustained in this by the judge, who ordered the witness to answer.

The latter, however, emphatically declared that although he held the judge's ruling in high respect, he nevertheless would not bring himself to give the information sought.

Rochette did not at the time consider that he was confessing, but the clergyman held it as his right to withhold this information, as he was the prisoner's spiritual adviser at the time and the prisoner looked upon him as such.

Several other questions of an indirect nature were then asked by the crown prosecutor for the purpose of eliciting at least in part what the witness had told the clergyman in order to obtain his consent in performing the marriage ceremony. One of the questions was whether it was not so that Rochette had said the girl whom he wished to wed would shortly give birth to a child, of which he (Rochette) would be the father. The clergyman remained unmoved, and asked the crown prosecutor to look upon him as having been non-existent at the time, for he said, he himself considered what transpired as buried in the forgotten past. The witness was then dismissed.

This is looked upon as a favorable point for the defense.

MORSE AND MCGUIGAN

Toronto, April 24.—Mr. F. W. Morse, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, came into Toronto last night in his private car, and is now at the King Edward Hotel.

"There is no significance," said Mr. McGuigan, "in my visit coming at the same time as Mr. Morse's. I am here on strictly private business not connected with the railroad in any form whatever."

A COWARDLY ATTACK.

Quebec, April 24.—News has reached town from Rimouski to the effect that Police Chief Gauthier, of that town, has been the victim of a cowardly, murderous attempt. Mr. Gauthier was on his way to Amqui, to make an arrest, when a shot was fired at him, and which he was traveling, fortunately no person was hurt.

CHARGED WITH BIGAMY.

Toronto, April 24.—James Turcotte, alias Murphy, a tinsmith, was arrested today on a charge of bigamy. It is alleged that on July 29, 1903, under the name of Turcotte he married Elizabeth Young, by whom he had one child, and on July 29, 1907, he married Joannah Thatcher under the name of Murphy. It was the first wife bringing an action for non-support that led to the discovery of the second marriage. He was remanded till the 28th.

CZAR'S NEW BATTLESHIPS

Russian Govt. Denies Having Them Built on the Clyde.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—The report published in England to the effect that the Russian Government had ordered five warships from a firm of Clyde shipbuilders is untrue. The admiral has adopted the principle that all battleships should be constructed in Russia, and it is impossible that any vessels have been ordered either here or abroad for this year. As the Duma intends to reject the estimates on the new battleships, the programme for 1909 will probably be small.

LITTLE TOTS CRUSHED

Killed While Gathering Flowers Beneath Wheel of Sawmill.

Lunenburg, N. S., April 23.—Report of a horrible accident comes from West Lohave ferry, where two little daughters of Henry Pernette, aged 9 and 11 years, went together for mayflowers.

There is a sawmill in the vicinity, and the children were in the habit of taking a short cut under the wheel when the mill was idle, to shorten the distance.

On this occasion the father warned them not to go in that direction, as the mill was to be set going this afternoon.

The children did not heed the warning, and when they were half-way under the wheel started.

The mill men noticed an obstruction stopped the machinery and found the little ones crushed beyond recognition.

ARRESTED IN ENGLAND

Charged With Defrauding Toronto Merchants of Much Merchandise.

Toronto, April 24.—Sydney Morris, who, with James Reid is alleged to have defrauded Toronto merchants out of between six and seven hundred dollars worth of goods, was arrested yesterday in London, England, and will be brought back to Canada for trial. Morris and Reid opened a warehouse here, ordered extensively from about a dozen wholesale dealers, sold some of the old country goods, and fled themselves. The wholesalers interested first placed the matter in the hands of the provincial detectives, but the wholesalers claim that they acted in such a dilatory manner that the men got away, and the board of trade is to be asked to make a complaint to the Government regarding it. The matter was then placed in the hands of the city detectives who had \$2,000 worth of the goods seized in England. These goods are now back in Toronto. The definite charges against Morris are the theft of clothing from F. C. Hunt, and conspiracy to defraud the W. R. Brock Company.

MR. MACKAY'S EXPOSE

(Continued From Page One.)

customary 30 days given for appealing from the decision of the Government examiners, the examiners may not be in the district judge.

The final appeal date was fixed as May 15; where the 30 days had run before May 15, the 30-day limit, of course, governed.

"I pointed out," said Mr. Mackay, "that from what I had learned as to this district and others would not be in shape for appeals to take place by May 15 that is; that the enumerators would not have finished holding their own courts by that date, and therefore that there would not be any opportunity to appeal. I was assured by two ministers, Mr. Arthur and the Attorney-General, that such was not the case, and that the lists were well under way, and that there would be some days at least before the 10th of May in which to launch appeals if desired.

Ministers Were in Dark.

"These ministers ought to know the facts. The enumerators are appointed by the Government, and I accepted the statement of the ministers on the floor of the House as authentic and reliable.

"Now, sir, just today I received information that in that very Port Arthur district neither of the enumerators I referred to will have completed his work. In fact, sir, my information is that on the Port Arthur and Duluth extension of the C. N. R. the enumerators only started to post up his notices on the 15th and his first court will not be held until May 19, so that he will hold all these courts after the last day fixed for appealing against his work at these courts.

"In the eastern district, then, will be a court on Simpson Island, as late as May 18. On the main line of the C. N. R. there is to be a late sitting, the date of which is not yet fixed. From none of these courts can there, as I recall the act, be any appeal at all.

Rank Injustice.

"The lists made out by the agents of the Government will be final. The Liberals of those districts must do the

best they can under this manifestly unfair handicap, and guard against loaded lists.

"I repeat, sir, that there was no excuse whatever for ministers of the crown misleading the House, as they clearly did, with reference to the progress of the enumerators' work, and in the face of the fact that I warned them with reference to this very same Port Arthur district, that the enumerators may load the lists at pleasure. It gives opportunity for deliberate, downright, dirty work. (Cheers).

Many other measures were rushed in at the last minute. Several matters, including the C. N. R. guarantee, were dealt with in the dying hours of the session.

"Such questions may have ministerial consideration for weeks, may be as discussed in caucus, but the Opposition have to rely upon the assurances of the minister who at the last moment introduced such measures.

"With reference to the C. N. R. guarantee, the Premier, in response to information I called for assured the House that, taking into consideration the former guarantee, it was in the interests of the province that the subsequent guarantee, with its securities, should be given.

"The credit for Government legislation goes to the Government, the discredit they would willingly visit on the Opposition, no matter how little is the opportunity given to understand the merits or the
