**Prosperity Has Characterized
Colborne Street Methodist Church**

**Successful Anniversary Service
—Directors Are Considering
Enlargement of Church.**

The most successful anniversary
services that have ever been celebrat-
ed in Colborne Street Methodist Church
marked the eighteenth year of the
church's existence yesterday. Both
morning and evening such crowds
were in attendance that the church was
incapable of accommodating them, and
many were turned away. Shortly
after the service commenced in the
morning, Rev. F. E. Malott made a
short address, in which he referred to
the growth that the church had made
since it was built.

"The congregation," said Mr. Malott,
"is now over five hundred, and is
growing rapidly. It is evident to
everyone that we must enlarge our
place of worship in the near future,
and I know you will be glad to learn
that the matter is to be gone on with
at once. On Friday night next the
board of directors meets to consider
plans for the enlargement of the
church."

Mr. Malott then asked that a special
offering be taken to aid the building
fund, and said that he hoped at least
\$600 would be realized. The offering
was then taken and subsequently
found to be nearly \$700.

Two eloquent and scholarly sermons
were preached by Rev. W. G. Howson,
formerly of Askin Street Church, but
now of Wingham. In the evening Mr.
Howson spoke on the subject, "See-
ing the Blue When the Sky is Dark,"
taking as his text, "The yet we may
abound in hope through the Holy
Spirit."

"Many people," said Mr. Howson,
"were too prone to look on the gloomy
side of everything. They could see
nothing good in anything and did not
seem to realize that often an affliction
was really a blessing in disguise. To
these people life at times seemed
hopeless, especially if their environ-
ment were one of sin or misery. God
thinks, however, set in every human be-
ing's nature, a certain amount of
divine optimism, and the more one fol-

lows and obeys the teachings of the
Holy Spirit the better one is able to
maintain that peace of mind, and cer-
tainly of the future, which everyone
should have."

In the evening Mr. Howson pre-
ached another eloquent sermon on "God
Girding Our Lives." His text was "I
have girded thee, though thou hear me
not." He drew a beautiful picture of
the care which God takes of everyone
whom he has placed in the world,
saying that God orders our lives and
directs and causes all things to work
for our good. "This is often done in
ways that we do not understand, and
for purposes that we do not see; but
it is done nevertheless surely, and in-
variably results in our betterment."

"The Lord is ever thinking of us
and watching over us and caring for
us, even when we are not thinking of
him, and surrounds us by his provid-
ence and love throughout our lives,"
said Mr. Howson, "and promises us
that if we live as we should, we shall
enjoy our future life even more."

The musical services, which were
under the direction of Mrs. Mowat,
beautifully rendered, and included a
number of solos by the Schubert
Ladies' Quartet; a solo by Mrs. Ed.
Wyatt, in the morning, and solos both
morning and evening by Mrs. Coch-
rane, which was well rendered.

At the conclusion of both the morn-
ing and evening services many citizens
called and congratulated Rev. Mr.
Malott upon the success his efforts
have met with since his coming here
in July last. Every month the mem-
bership has shown a substantial in-
crease, and last month thirty-six
new members were admitted to the
church. The history of the church has
been one of progress ever since it
started.

The present church was built eigh-
teen years ago, under the pastorate
of Rev. E. B. Lancelley, and was the
successor of the old Pall Mall Meth-
odist Church, the original branch of
which was founded in 1850. An in-

yesterday's anniversary was the pres-
ence of Mr. Richard Oke, of St. James
street, who is the oldest member of
the church. Mr. Oke is now 84 years
old, and first joined the church in

**TIMELY WORDS
FROM THE PULPIT**
The Seventeenth Anniversary of
St. George's Church—Advice
To Young Men.

Yesterday marked the seventeenth
anniversary of the building of St.
George's Church, in West London, and
at both services there were large con-
gregations. In the morning Very Rev.
Dean Davis occupied the pulpit and
preached a powerful sermon on the
subject of "Redeeming the Time."

Very Rev. Dean Davis is really the
founder of St. George's Church, hav-
ing commenced a little mission not
far from where the present church
stands over thirty-three years ago. In
the course of his remarks he referred
to the original members before him,
and to know that they were still ac-
tively engaged in church work. In
the evening the services were conducted
by Ven. Archdeacon Richardson, who
spoke on "The Message of the Church
to the World."

At the Congregational Church Rev.
D. S. Hamilton spoke of the mission
work which was being conducted, and
made a special appeal to all to help
the Congregational Church in its ef-
fort to raise \$10,000 to the present working
in West Central Africa.

At Dundas Street Center Church
Rev. E. B. Lancelley spoke to a large
congregation on "Love's Brotherhood."
Mr. Lancelley dealt especially with
the problems presented in modern life
by the difference between capital and
labor. Much would be done to solve
this difficult problem, he thought, if
capital would consider the rights of
labor, instead of the duties of labor,
and if labor would consider the rights
of capital instead of the duties of
capital.

Rev. Dyson Hague preached in the
evening to young men and his remarks
were listened to with a great deal of
attention by a large audience. Mr.
Hague, in his remarks, spoke of how
easy it was for people to devote
themselves, and instanced the fact
that a large number of men who
boasted of their political liberty were
dominated by political corruption. Mr.
Hague urged his hearers to make a
stand for the truth which alone could
make everyone free.

At St. Paul's Church, in the morn-
ing, the pulpit was filled by Rev. Mr.
Antle, a well-known mission worker,
who has for many years labored in
British Columbia. Mr. Antle gave a
most interesting account of his work
at the coast mission.
