NEW STEEL METHOD.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., June 24.—Mr. W. C. Franz, manager of the Lake Superior Corporation, in an interview today, stated that the new No. 3 open-hearth furnace would make its first steel today. The foundation work on No. 3 blast furnace has been started, and it is expected that in two weeks' time work will be commenced on the new structural mill, which will include all requirements for making structural steel. The making of steel in the new open-hearth furnace today brings to successful culmination the first improvement under the new management, that is, since English capital was introduced into the concern. Mr. Franz said it would take about a year to complete the blast furnace and about seven months to have the structural steel mill in operation.

ALD. COOPER GROWS QUITE ECONOMICAL NOW

Objects to City Engineer Employing Inspector to Watch Work Done by Street Railway.

At last night's meeting of the board of works there was considerable discussion over the city having to pay a man to watch the work being done by the London Street Railway Company in connection with the laying of a pavement on Adelaide street, north of Dundas.

"I want to know," Ald. Cooper demanded of City Engineer Graydon, "if Mr. Lowe, who is inspector there now, is in the pay of the city."

"Certainly, he is," replied the city engineer.

"It is high time we drew the line then on our expense," said Ald. Cooper warmly. "I don't think it is necessary to have a man paid by the city to see that the street railway do their work properly. I think they should be responsible for what they do. That inspector doesn't do any work. You gentlemen don't get your money that easy, and I have to work for mine, and I don't see why this man should be paid by the city for such a job."

Mr. Graydon's Opinion.

"If you don't have a man to watch them the street railway will spoil the whole thing," said Engineer Graydon. Assistant Engineer Wright cited a case that had been reported to him, where he had staked out a line to be two inches from the rail, and the street railway men were working to three inches when the inspector noticed it.

"Then hold them responsible, and make them make it right," said Ald. Cooper. "That is what they would do in other cities."

"You must have a man, though," said Engineer Graydon.

"I think so, too," said Ald. Saunders, "and I wouldn't stand for the street railway doing any work without an inspector to see that they were doing it right."

"It's all nonsense," said Ald. Cooper, "and every citizen that gets his tax bill knows that the expense of running the city is getting unendurable."

The matter then dropped.

Want Poles Removed.

Darch & Sons asked for the removal of the telegraph poles on Talbot street from Dundas to King. Engineer Graydon said it could be done provided the fire alarm wires could be removed. It was decided to leave the matter over until next Thursday night and have Chief Atkins report.

Paving Ridout Street.

A tender from the Barber Asphalt Company to pave Ridout street, between King and Dundas streets, and put down a sewer for \$2,413, came as a surprise to the board.

"It can't be true," said the mayor. "There was never a block paved in London for that money."

"I never heard of such a bargain," said Ald. Cooper. "We had better accept at once."

"We sure will," said Ald. Rose, and he moved the acceptance of the tender.

"It is the cheapest I ever heard of," said the mayor.

Fullerton Street Sewer.

At a former meeting the matter of initiating a sewer for 150 feet on Fullerton street, was laid over for further consideration, as the board thought it would be advisable to place a sewer on the whole street, or else not put any down at all. The people, however, petitioned against the whole street having a sewer laid on it, and the board decided to lay the 150 feet originally asked for, and the rest of the street by a two-thirds vote of the council.

Cheapside Street Park.

It was decided to leave the question of making the park 600 feet long and 20 feet wide on Cheapside street, between Richmond and St. George, over until next Thursday night.

The question of maintaining the park caused some discussion, but it was decided that the city should maintain it. Ald. Rose moved that on account of the street watering men having so little time to put in owing to the wet weather, that they be given a chance to do some other city work.

"We will put them at work the first thing in the morning," said Engineer Graydon, "hauling broken stone."

Against a Sewer.

A petition against a proposed sewer on the Pipe Line road was received and granted. The people there found the cost of the sewer would be very great owing to the nature of the soil, and decided they could not afford it.
