The base runner who overruns first base will be allowed more latitude in the tuture. The present rule forbids him even turning in the direction of second base after passing first without first running the risk of being retired. A year ago the rules were amended to the extent that they were errors when the batter gained first, and now the rule tinkerers go the limit in placing the blame on the pitchers and catcher. The umpires scored a point when the limit in the coacher's boxes were made smaller, according to the old rules a coacher might run as far as either fence if he so desired, if he remained a certain distance from the foul line. Now he must keep himself in a space of fifteen feet.


