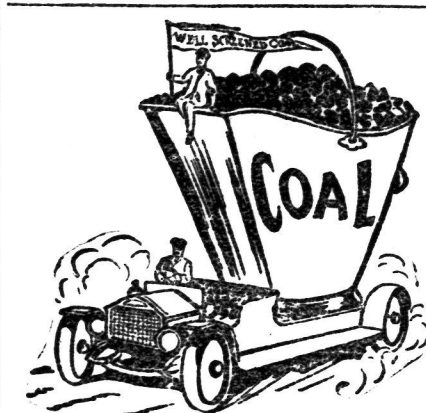

TOO MUCH JOHNSTON IN THE POLICE COURT

Two Men of the Famous Name Lined Up Before Mayor Beattie Today.

Charles Johnston, a little man not more than four feet eight inches in height, but sturdily built, looked out from between the bars of the prison-cage at the police court this morning and told Mayor Beattie, who was presiding magistrate, that his home was in St. Andrews, N. B., and that when his house was burned there recently he lost everything. He was on his way, he said, to a sister in the United States, and had left his wife and three children in St. Andrews. Johnston, it seems, has been getting too much assistance, and Wednesday afternoon treated himself to a few drinks too many. He spent the night in the cells, and this morning Mayor Beattie gave him 24 hours to get out of town. Johnston has been beating his way as best he can he told the police.

A Ballymore Johnston.
William Johnston told the court he was from Ballymore, and last night a man who he said to be a driver home with went away without him. Johnston said he had gotten very cold and took a few drinks to warm him. He did not think he was very drunk. The court let him go. Nellie Snell, a young woman who was recently warned by Magistrate Love that she would be sent to the local for six months if she came up again, was gathered in last night on a charge of vagrancy. Her husband, who was also arrested, was charged with being drunk. He asked to be placed on the list and let go. "I will remind you both to jail until Monday," said the court. "You will be dealt with then."

MORE MONEY WANTED FOR VICTORIA HOSPITAL

Sum of \$3,714.89 in Excess of Last Request for 1910—The Figures.

The hospital trust are asking for \$3,714.89 more this year to run Victoria Hospital than was expended last year. Their estimates show a probable expenditure of \$74,957, while the sum of \$71,242.11 was expended in 1909. By the way there was a surplus of \$42.17 last year.

Supplies of all kinds are more expensive. Meat, butter, etc., all show an increase. Light and power have gone up \$700. Salaries, owing to the opening of the isolation hospital, have gone up, as twelve more nurses had to be employed. This necessitated the fixing up of the third floor of the Nurses' Home to accommodate the new nurses, and meant an expenditure of over \$500.

The Receipts From Patients.
The receipts from paying patients was placed at \$26,000. Last year it was \$26,800, the highest in the history of the institution. The sum of \$1,500 was placed in the estimate for an auxiliary boiler for the contagious building. "The estimates are as close as we can possibly figure them," said Mr. Sutherland. "We have gone over them from time to time, and can suggest nothing that would improve matters."

ANNUITIES FOR WOMEN
Deputation Urges Rates Should Be the Same as Those for Men.

Ottawa, March 10.—A deputation representing the National Council of Women waited upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier yesterday and asked that rates for annuities for Government annuitants for women be made the same as those for men. Insurance statistics indicate that women live longer than men, and hence the rates for annuities are slightly higher than those collected from men. The Premier promised to consider the ladies' request.

NO COMPULSORY EDUCATION
Manitoba Government Votes Down Resolution.

Winnipeg, March 10.—On a straight party vote, the resolution of the Opposition declaring in favor of compulsory education was defeated last night in the Legislature. The Minister of Education declared that he was in favor of the principle of compulsory education, but claimed that if such an act were enforced the Roman Catholics would appeal to the whole school question would be reopened.
