PRINTERS TO PROBE TEXT-BOOK SITUATION

Want School Primers Published By Employers of Union Labor.

[Canadian Press.]
Cleveland, O., Aug. 14.—That the International Typographical Union, now holding its annual convention here, probably will take action on a resolution demanding nationwide investigation by the union of the school text-book situation, became known today.
Delegate J. H. Strief, of Sioux City, Ia., is author of the resolution. It sends authorization for the executive council to investigate the publishing industry and to "campaign for the adoption by schools of text books manufactured by employers of union labor."
In addition to resuming consideration of the report of the committee on law, the convention heard a number of addresses today. Among the scheduled speakers were H. N. Kellogg, chairman of the special standing committee of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association, and W. B. Prescott, ex-president of the International Typographical Union.

IRELAND'S POPULATION.
London, August 14.—The annual report of the registrar-general for Ireland shows a decrease in Irish population during the period from 1901 to 1911 of only 1.2 per cent compared with 6.2 in the preceding decade.
The immigrants for 1911 are 4,000 below the average for the decade.

ROSE BANK DRIVE GOES RAPIDLY AHEAD

Parks Superintendent Says That Satisfactory Progress Is Being Made at Springbank.

Three trimming throughout the city will be commenced the last week in August or the first week in September. Parks Superintendent Dilger reported that he had everything in readiness for the work, but suggested that some means of conveyance be provided for him in order that he might cover the city.

Mr. Emery B. Hamilton was instructed by the committee to secure a suitable horse and rig for the purpose.

The superintendent reported progress with reference to the Rose Bank drive at Springbank. The sides of the road were being sodded, and satisfactory results had been obtained.
It was decided to gravel the roads in Queen's and Victoria Parks at once. Superintendent Dilger suggested that the ground surrounding the new arts building at Queen's Park be terraced. He declared that it could be well arranged. The commission agreed to do the work at their own expense provided the Western Fair directors would supply the material. Chairman Marr will interview them regarding the matter.

The accounts were passed, and some routine business disposed of. Those present were Chairman John Marr, Emery B. Hamilton, W. E. Saunders, Parks Superintendent Dilger, and Miss Beulah Newmans, secretary.

WORK'S GREAT ESTATE.
New York, Aug. 15.—The net estate left by Frank Work, who was one of the best known horsemen in the country, and for years a prominent figure in Wall street, is \$13,500,000, according to figures filed in the surrogate court by a transfer tax appraiser. Mr. Work died here in March, 1911. Aside from his city home here his entire estate was made up of stocks and bonds in numerous corporations. It was bequeathed for the most part to his children and grandchildren.

Dispatches From the Tunnel
LULU PARKER'S DEATH WAS HASTENED BY NEGLIGENCE

Jury Thoroughly Investigated the Case at Mandaumin and Found That Little Girl Died From Cholera Morbus—Aunt Was Suspicious.

Sarnia, Aug. 14.—The inquest into the death of nine-year-old Lulu Parks who died last Thursday under suspicious circumstances, at her parents' home near Mandaumin, was held this afternoon in the town hall. The little court room was crowded with men and women, even standing space being taken.
The first witness called was Mary Doyle, the nurse who attended the sick child. Given briefly, Miss Doyle's testimony was to the effect that she had warned the father and step-mother to get a doctor.
Mrs. Story, a neighbor, was the next witness to take the stand. Mrs. Story was asked if she had said that Mrs. Parks told her that Mr. Parks remarked when told that the child was dangerously ill and liable to die, "Oh, she isn't going to die; no such luck as that."
The witness admitted this. Dr. Morrison, one of the physicians who conducted the post mortem, testified that the little girl died from acute bacterial infection and enteritis. Several others were placed in the witness box, including Mrs. Parks, Mr. Parks and Mrs. Strangway, the aunt who was responsible for the inquest.
Aunt Was Suspicious.
The crown endeavored to determine why the aunt had become suspicious,

and notified the authorities. The woman, however, could give no good reasons, and she was turned over to Mr. Towers, attorney for the Parks, who wittingly asked her "whether she had ever been examined as to her sanity."

Taken Seriously.
According to the evidence of the various witnesses it appears that the little child became sick a week ago Sunday, after eating cucumbers, her condition rapidly growing worse. The parents were advised to call a doctor, but Mr. Parks did not believe it necessary, although at the inquest it was brought out that any ordinary person would have recognized the immediate need of a medical man.
At the last moment Dr. Morrison was sent for, but it was too late to save the child's life. Mrs. Parks, who is the step-mother of the deceased girl, appeared willing to send for a medical man, but her husband objected. The aunt, Mrs. Strangway, became suspicious after the death, and insisted on an investigation by the authorities.

The Verdict.
The coroner's jury, after deliberating for one hour and a half, decided that the deceased child died of cholera morbus, and in their opinion her death was hastened by lack of prompt medical attendance. It is said that the stomach of the girl has been sent to Toronto for analysis, but Dr. I. L. Jones, the coroner, says he knows nothing about it.

DEFECTIVE WIRING MAY CAUSE RAISE IN RATES

Representative of Fire Underwriters Is Not Satisfied With Conditions.

Sarnia, Aug. 14.—A representative for the Canadian underwriters was in Sarnia recently inspecting the wiring in buildings throughout the town, and announces, after having completed his inspection, that the wiring is defective and must be remedied, otherwise the underwriters will raise their rates.
The finding of the representative came as quite a shock to the many people here, and has caused much comment. Many are in favor of a law regulating such matters properly, that is, having electricians qualify to certain specifications, a fixed standard of work, etc.
