## BARBERS RAISE SHAVE PRICES

After June 1st it Will Cost You  
Fifteen Cents Each  
Time.

## SAME FOR NECK SHAVE

Woe unto you who have to be shaved three times a week, for after June 1st it will look like 45 cents instead of 30 cents. At a meeting of the Barbers' Association in Moose Hall on Thursday evening the barbers unanimously decided to raise the price of a shave, including neck shave, to 15 cents. The reason for this raise is that the cost of living has come up in the city the last 46 years, and the price of a shave has not. The cost of barbers' supplies has materially increased, and the barbers feel justified in charging the 15 cents for a shave.

Every shop in the city, with two exceptions, have decided to make the increased charge. The barber shops will close on Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, commencing June 1.

## CITY IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR DAMAGE BY RIVER

Where Water Encroaches on Ridout Street Property.

The board of works Thursday night decided to pay another 15 per cent, or \$375, of the contract price of the new incinerator to Laurie & Lamb, the contractors. Twenty per cent, of the price will be still retained until the incinerator is found to be satisfactory after one month's test.

City Solicitor Meredith gave it as his opinion that the storm sewers could be put down as local improvements, provided they were petitioned for. The storm sewer question will be voted upon in the form of a bylaw. Mr. Meredith also stated that the city was in no way responsible for the protection of private property on Ridout street, where the river is encroaching, but which has been laid for some years in that city only had to look after the

safeguarding of the roadway. If the citizens want to build a breakwater they can do so as a local improvement.

Sewers Recommended.

On the recommendation of the board of health, sewers will be laid on Central avenue from Adelaide to Elizabeth street, and on Hyman street from Richmond to St. George.

Walks will be laid on Dundas street east, Princess avenue, Charlotte street, Westmoreland avenue, Dorinda street, and Riverview avenue. Lorne avenue will be opened to Dorinda street at an estimated cost of \$700, of which amount the city will pay \$250, and the remainder will be assessed against the private property benefitting.

Grading and other improvements will be made on Eva and Florence streets. Wortley road residents petitioned for a Roemac pavement. The city engineer will write to Toronto to inquire as to the durability of this pavement, which has been laid for some years in that city.
