WINTER SALVES.
For the chapped lips that winter is
sometimes responsible for, an excellent
remedy is a cream having mutton tallow
as the basis. Mix enough to make two
tablespoonsful, strain through cheese-
cloth, and add a teaspoonful of sweet
almond oil and a pinch of powdered
camphor. Beat up together till nearly
cold, and put into a pot for use.
A good cream has four ounces of mutton
tallow, strained, with four ounces of
almond oil, one teaspoonful of spirits of
camphor, ten drops of carbolic acid,
one ounce of peroxide of hydrogen, and,
if liked, a few drops of perfume. The
daily use of this tends to whiten and
soften the skin.
