SHIPPING SITUATION CLEARING.
LONDON, May 26.—A decided change for the better has been noted this week in the relations between the British Government and the representatives of neutral shippers whose cargoes have come under the ban of the orders-in-council. RUSSIANS BATTLE TO HOLD ENEMIES

Desperate Fighting Is in Progress on Both Banks of River.

GERMANS NEAR OSSOWETZ

Repulsed by Fire of the Fortress, Is Petrograd Report.

[Canadian Press.]

PETROGRAD, May 26.—(Via London, May 27, 2 a.m.)—An official communication issued by the war office this evening says:

"In the region of Shavli there has been no important change, but the fighting there continues.

"Near Ossowetz, on the outskirts of the village of Sosna, a German attack was repulsed by the fire of the fortress. In the vicinity of Lomza there has been a violent artillery fire in certain sectors.

"On the left bank of the Vistula on May 24 and the succeeding night, we repelled many terrible attacks by the enemy.

"A desperate battle on both sides of the River San, in the region between Jaroslau and Przemysl, continued throughout the day of the 25th. Between Przemysl and the marsh of the Dniester the enemy continued his fierce artillery fire, and also brought important forces into play in the sector of Gostkow and Krakenika. All attacks in this region have been successfully repulsed.

"In the trans-Dniester region and in Bukovina there is no change in the situation."

An official communication from the Russian army headquarters in the Caucasus says:

"Our troops have occupied Mirandub. During a fight in the region of Karadent two hundred Cossacks charged the Turks and sabred two companies of them.

"There has been no change in the other sectors."

Position Well in Hand.
Although German activity continues in Central Galicia, on both sides of the San River, between Jaroslau and Przemysl, the Russians assert they have now the situation well in hand. They state that the German drive from Cracow through Galicia, and also the parallel movement on the left side of the Vistula, which reached the Kielbaso River, have lost their impetus, and that the Russians are now ready to take the initiative.

Pessimists' Views.
Less optimistic observers believe that the check of the German movement is due to the necessity of bringing fresh supplies of ammunition, after which their aggressive will resume its former intensity.

In the district between Przemysl and the Dniester the Russians already have begun a successful advance, capturing a number of small villages on the left bank of the Dniester. On the right side of the river the struggle of the opposing forces still swings forward and backward without definite gain for either side.

Soon Retaken.
On Monday the Germans captured Russian trenches near Sionsko, following up an intense artillery fire with bayonet charge. The Russian troops, however, recovered the trenches on the same day.

On the Dolina-Kolomoia front there has been a violent and prolonged artillery duel, without change in the positions of either side.

The Russians estimate that more than 7,000 prisoners have been taken between the Vistula and the Dniester in the last three days.

AUSTRIAN REPORT.
VIENNA (via London), May 26.—10:35 p.m.—The following communication was issued this evening:

"In the northeastern war theatre, the battle near Przemysl is proceeding. Gen. Mackensen's army is making successful progress on both banks of the San, a southeasterly direction. A crossing of the San has been forced east of Radymno.

BRITISH WARSHIP SUNK AT GALLIPOLI

Triumph Victim of Submarine But Most of Crew Saved.

WAS FORMERLY FLAGSHIP

Had Seen More Fighting in Present War Than Any Ship.

LONDON, May 26.—11:36 p.m.—The British battleship Triumph has been sunk in the Dardanelles. This official announcement was made tonight.

The disaster to the Triumph is described in a brief statement by the Admiralty, which says that while operating in support of the Australian and New Zealand forces on the shore of the Gallipoli peninsula yesterday the Triumph was torpedoed by a submarine and sank shortly afterwards.

The majority of the officers and men, including the captain and commander, are reported to have been saved. The submarine was chased by destroyers and patrolling small craft until dark.

Probably German.
The official announcement does not say whether the submarine was British or German, but it probably was of the latter nationality, as the British Admiralty has not yet announced the sinking of any German submarine.

The Triumph, which was purchased from Chile upon her completion in 1902, had seen more fighting than any ship in the British navy in the present war.

BUILT IN 1902.
The British battleship Triumph was built at Barrow in 1902 for the Chilean Government, but was purchased by Great Britain in 1908. She was last down under the name of the Constitution which also was purchased from Chile and re-christened Swiftsure.

Since the present war broke out after the Triumph has been in operation in both far eastern and European waters. As flagship of the British Asiatic squadron she participated in the bombardment of the German base at Tsingtau, China, last October and was reported to have been damaged by shell fire of the German forts.

After the fall of Tsingtau the Triumph returned to European waters and early in present year began operations with the other units of the allied fleet against the Dardanelles. In the latter part of April the Triumph bombarded the Turkish trenches on the western end of Gallipoli peninsula and afterwards went into the Dardanelles to search the trench from a different angle. Here she came under the fire of a Turkish howitzer battery on the Asiatic shore, which dropped sixteen shells around her and threw three missiles on board. Little damage was done by the shells, however, and only two men, a stoker and a bluejacket, were wounded. The battleship silenced the Turkish battery before retiring.

Fired on Town of Malaga.
A few days later, while landing operations were proceeding, the Triumph with other warships, in addition to covering the landing, bombarded the town of Malaga to prevent reinforcements reaching the town from the sea of Marmora. The Triumph was credited in the official reports with having set fire to the town of Malaga during this bombardment.

The Triumph, which was commanded by Captain Maurice S. Fitzmaurice, was a vessel of 11,885 tons and 12,500 horsepower. Her crew of officers and men in times of peace numbered about 700 men. The vessel carried four 18-inch, fourteen 5-inch guns and fourteen 14-pounders and four 6-pounders. In addition she carried two 18-inch torpedo tubes.

The Triumph was 436 feet long and had a speed of about 20 knots.

SINKS TURK BOAT WITHIN SIGHT OF CONSTANTINOPLE

PARIS, May 27.—5 a.m.—A Turkish gunboat of the Aldin type was sunk in the Sea of Marmara, within sight of Constantinople, by a British submarine, according to an Athens dispatch to the Journal.

The loss of the gunboat, following close upon the destruction of Turkish transports last week, has caused a deep impression in Constantinople.

Nothing Too Dear OR TOO SACRED TO OFFER FOR COUNTRY

Archbishops of Canterbury and York Issue Letter—Plea for Christendom.

LONDON, May 26.—11:30 p.m.—The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have issued the following pastoral letter, which is to be read in all churches, June 6:

"After ten months of war we see more clearly than at first the greatness and severity of the ordeal which is putting the spirit of our nation to the test. The spirit arrayed against us threatens the very foundation of civilized order in Christendom. It wields an immense and ruthless power. It can only be decisively rolled back if we, for our part, concentrate the whole strength of body, mind and soul which our nation and our empire holds."

Foe Paralyzed By the Attacks Of Canadians

Germans' Hold in Region of LeBassee Is Being Broken.

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.]

LONDON, May 26.—Canadian and Indian troops on Tuesday night successfully repulsed, at the point of the bayonet, a vigorous German attack near Richebourg.

"Having destroyed the British wire defences by means of a terrific artillery fire, the enemy launched a strong attack and succeeded, despite severe losses suffered in the open, in reaching our trench. Here, says a Central News message, they were met with an inferno of rifle and machine gun fire, before which they wavered. Then the Canadians and Indians leaped from their trenches and met the German reserves with the bayonet as the latter warmed up to strengthen the thinned first line.

"The colonials, fighting with terrific vigor, simply paralyzed the attack of the enemy, who were pursued into the open. Our losses were heavy, but those suffered by the Germans were severe, both morally and materially.

"The progress made justifies the belief that the German hold on the region of LeBassee will very soon become untenable and necessitate withdrawal to a new line defence.

WARNING TO HOTELMEN WHO CLOSE HOUSES

TORONTO, May 26.—The Ontario license board has issued a warning that where in some local option municipalities former hotel licensees have not only closed their houses, but refused to sell or lease to others, desiring to serve

the needs of the travelling public, such action will be regarded as a serious obstacle to their procuring licenses again at any time in future under the jurisdiction of the board.

BATTLESHIP RESCUES RYNDAM PASSENGERS

NEW YORK, May 26.—Seventy-seven passengers, saved from possible death in the chilly waters of the Atlantic when the Holland-America Line steamship Ryndam collided early today with the tramp steamer Joseph J. Cuneo, off Nantucket Shoals Lightship, were brought safely to port tonight by the battleship South Carolina, which participated in the rescue.

The Ryndam, conveyed to Ambrose Lightship by the battleship Texas, reached the harbor before her passengers arrived, and anchored down the bay. She was drawing thirty-six feet of water and much of her cargo, containing foodstuffs for Holland, valued at a million dollars was destroyed. A hole in her side below the water-line about the width of a plate, was stopped with canvas. The Cuneo is proceeding to port under her own steam with a badly damaged bow.

Most of the passengers of the Ryndam were foreigners returning home.

TWENTY-EIGHT OF CREW SUFFER FROM BERT-BERT

NEW YORK, May 26.—The British steamer Dewa, laden with sugar from Cienfuegos, Cuba, came into port tonight with 28 out of her crew of 40 men suffering from beri beri. Since leaving Cienfuegos seven of her crew died from the disease and were buried at sea. Most of the work aboard the ship had to be done by the officers, and engineers, who were compelled to go into the store-house and help feed the boilers.

BUDAPEST, May 26, via Amsterdam to London, May 27.—2:54 a.m.—Count Stephan Tissa, the Hungarian Premier today delivered a stirring speech before the Chamber of Deputies. He explained Austria-Hungary's position toward the Italian demands during the last four weeks and received a tremendous ovation when he closed with the following declaration: "We shall now, more than before, astonish the entire world with the spectacle of our power of action, virility, unity and resolution. The Hungarian nation, united with all the people of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy and with our powerful ally, will wage this war to the last breath against all the devils of hell and force victory from fate."
