CUBANS DEMAND GOVT. FLOAT EXTERIOR LOAN

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 7.—Cuban business interests vitally affected by the prevailing financial and economic crises are becoming impatient because of the delay in government negotiations for a \$50,000,000 exterior loan to help normalize the country. Their vehement inquiries have just elicited information from official quarters to the effect that congressional approval of loan legislation cannot be expected until the legislative committee in charge of framing tariff and tax reforms have finished their arduous task.

Conferences between administration officials and congressional leaders, however, are being held daily, and it is hoped that a program that Congress will approve will be settled upon as soon as the administration has finished reducing the budget and the tariff and tax committee have made their recommendations. Assurances that the government's income would be so adjusted as

to meet the additional interest and sinking fund loan charges were the prime requisites demanded by the American bankers.
