"We are not afraid of the British coal," said Mr. Murray. "It has been imported before without seriously affecting the mining industry or the market in the United States.

"Compared with the weekly pro duction of the United States mines and the weekly consumption by United States industries all the coal that could be brought from England would not amount to a drop in the bucket.'

As the wage negotiations proceed the miners are becoming more and more determined that the next contract shall contain an inviolable pro vision for installation of the checkoff system in all anthracite mines.
