FINES TWO FOR SELLING LIQUOR

Magistrate Graydon Imposes \$500 Penalties On London Citizens.

Case Against Nathan Goldberg Adjourned Until Tuesday Morning.

Two Londoners, Mrs. Arthur Taylor and Fred Maul, were fined \$500 and costs each by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in police court Monday afternoon on charges of selling liquor illegally, after the magistrate had heard evidence presented by three special O. T. A. enforcement officers who are operating in this district.

Grant Fielding, William White and William Simons, the officers from Toronto, told of visiting Mrs. Taylor's home on Central avenue two weeks ago Sunday and buying six drinks for \$5.

According to Mrs. Taylor and two men, W. J. Wilson and Leslie Harrison, who were at the house waiting for her husband to come home the three officers came to the door and were refused admission. Both men stated they knew Simons to see him, but were not positive as to the identity of the other two officers.

Mrs. Taylor claimed she told the three strangers that she did not keep liquor at the house.

Fred Maul was boarding at 235 Clarence street when White, Simons and other men arrived to buy drinks. He admitted he received \$3 from them, but declared he did not serve drinks. This, however, did not save him, for a \$500 fine was imposed.

A second charge which had been laid against him was withdrawn when a conviction was registered.

Officers obtained the name of the proprietor of the house, Austin Melkie, in police court, and it is probable a charge will be laid against him also.

The case against Nathan Goldberg, who is also charged with selling liquor, was adjourned until Tuesday morning, as the case against Charles Cox, which was heard early in the afternoon, is said to be closely allied with the one against Goldberg.

Judgment in the case of Sade Sig-kind, who was also charged with being a bootlegger, and who has been convicted twice previously, once in 1917, and once in 1918, will be given Tuesday morning.

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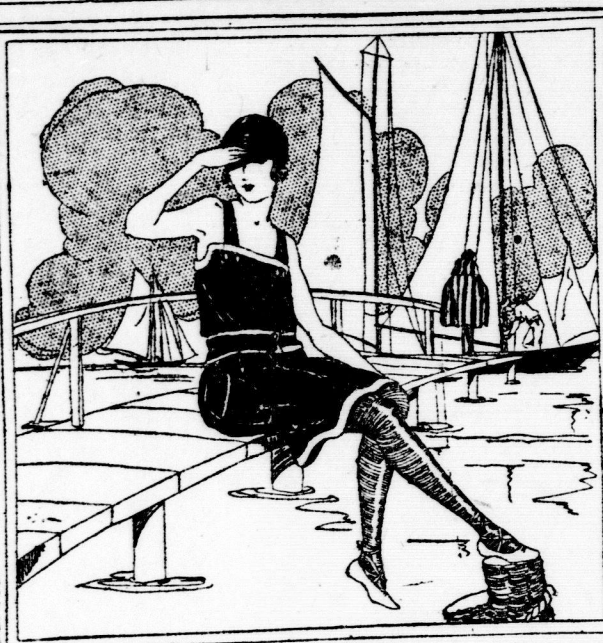

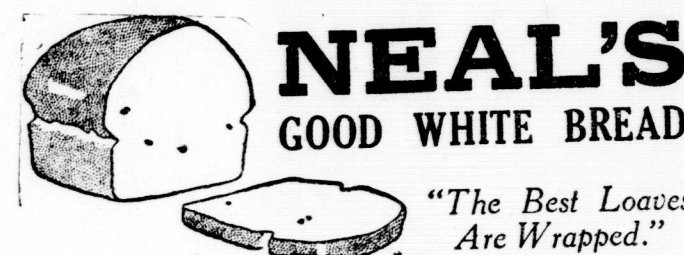

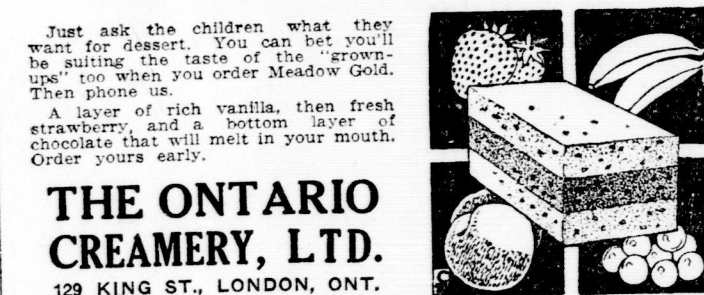

out of \$8,725,055 of claims filed against German debtors by Canadian creditors, only \$364,488 have been admitted by the German government.

So great has become the difficulty in getting action by Germany that the deputy custodian of enemy property in Canada, Thomas Mulvey, K.C., is proceeding to England to expedite the settlement of claims. Mr. Mulvey is being accompanied by O. M. Biggar, K.C., who has been appointed an officer for the purpose of order-in-council. Unless the German authorities are prepared to make a satisfactory settlement of these debt claims, the Canadian representatives will present the matters in dispute to the mixed arbitral tribunal which has authority to deal with them under the treaty.

DRIVER OF BUS STRICKEN,
BUT AVERTS CATASTROPHE

Welland Man Suffers Stroke—Stops Car Before Becoming Unconscious.

WELLAND, July 10.—A catastrophe was averted by some providential warning and the presence of mind and devotion to duty of Robert Phillips, driver of the Welland-Port Colborne bus, of which P. S. Peacock of this city is the proprietor. The bus left Port Colborne this morning. When nearing Ramsey's Bend the two passengers in the bus noticed the driver appeared to be in some difficulty and was shutting off

his engine and applying the brakes. This done, he pitched forward upon the wheel as the car came to a standstill.

The passengers found him unconscious. H. R. Hadden, passing in his car, stopped to investigate, and then drove the bus into the city, where Phillips was taken to the residence of Mr. Peacock, and medical aid summoned. The physician pronounced it a stroke, and the unfortunate man was later removed to the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Brown.

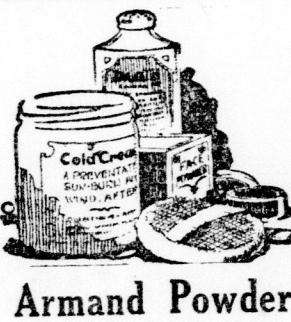

DELAY PASSING OF TARIFF MEASURE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 10.—(By Canadian Press.)—Evidence is increasing daily that the tariff bill will be delayed after the November election. Senate Republicans, who talked frankly about the difficulties of the bill, today said that it was doubtful whether it could be passed before October, and that they were apprehensive of the political results for the Republican party if the measure were permitted to go into effect before the elections.
