

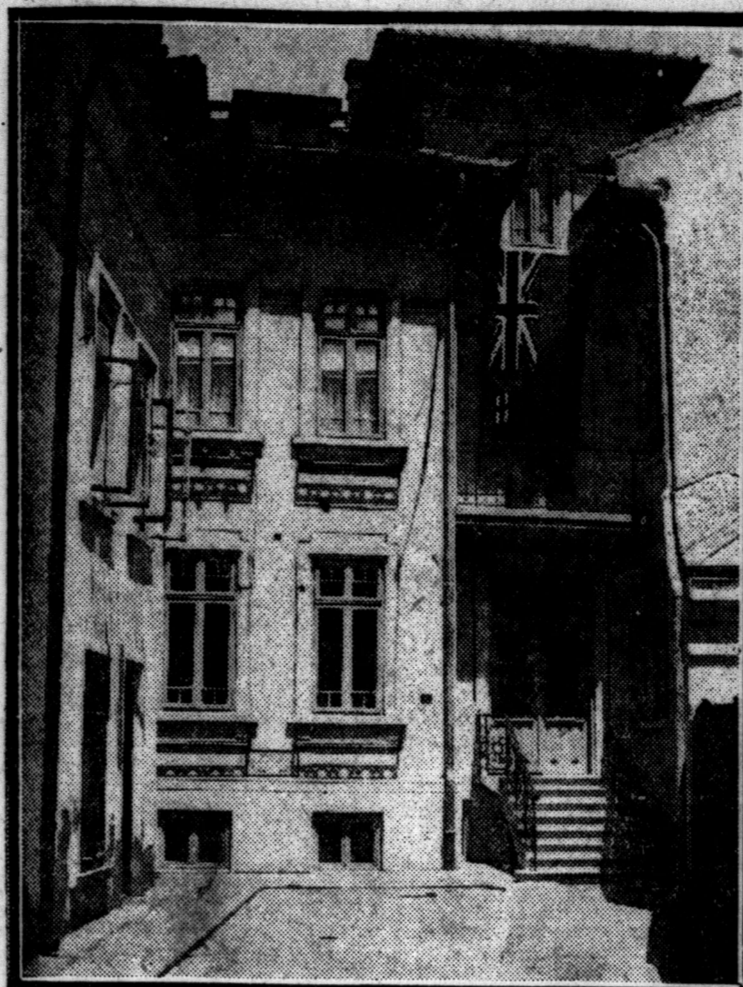

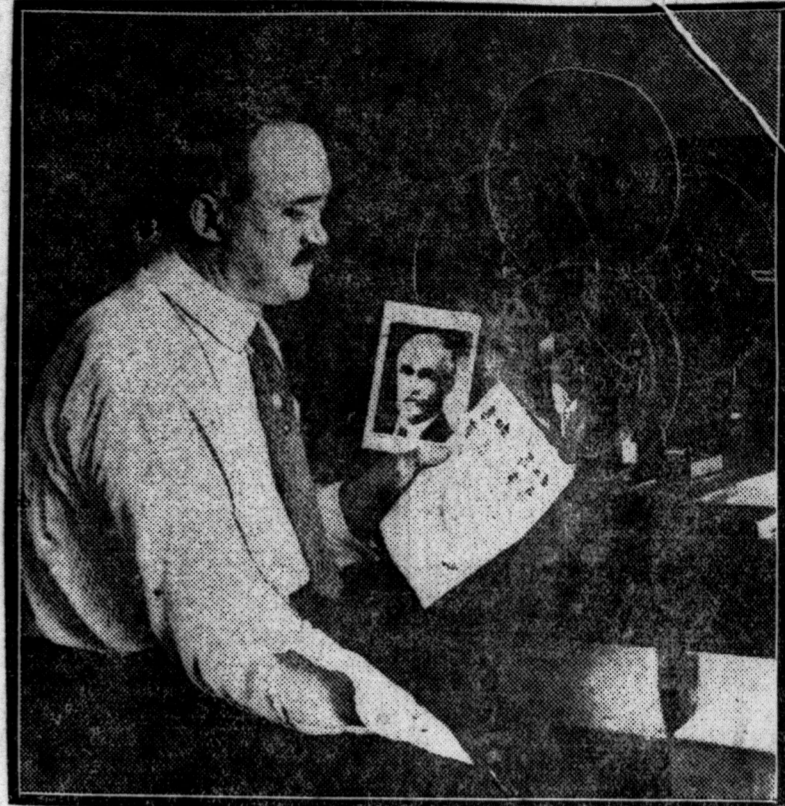
Miss Dorothy Parker of Toronto finds herself in the lime-light because she danced with the Prince of Wales at Quebec.

Miss Tatania Adell, the noted fashion designer, is off for the continent to bring back some new ideas in dress styles.



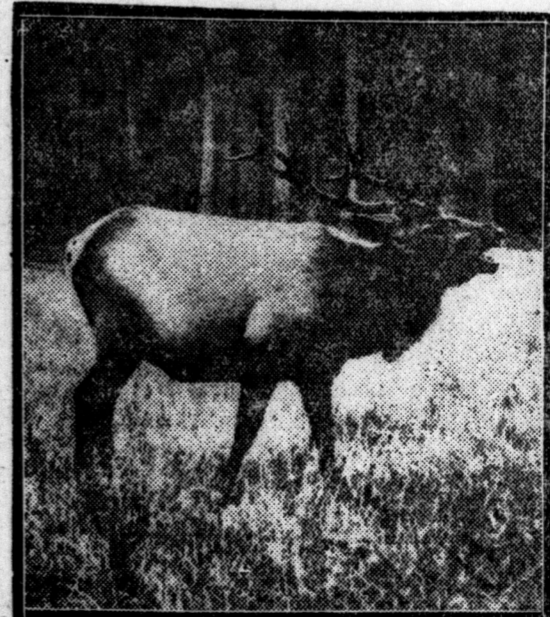

J. K. Foster takes a pot-shot at a stray grouse in the butts of his large Yorkshire estate.



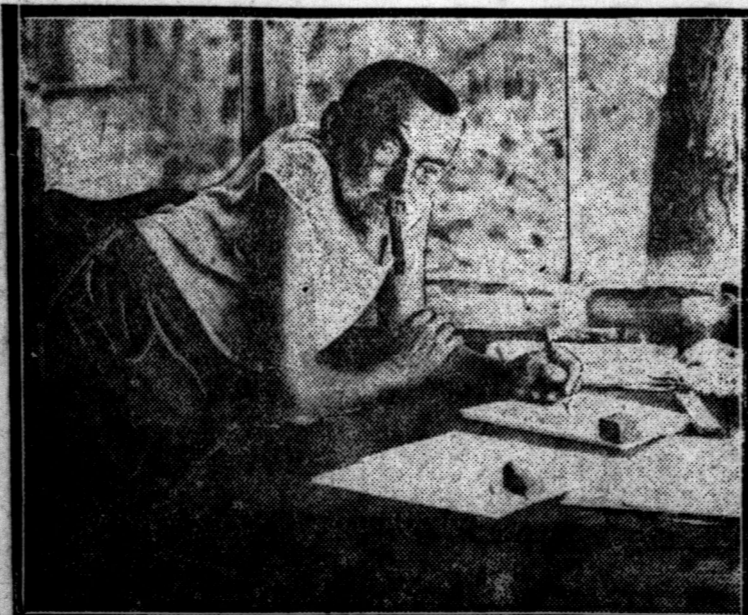
A remarkably fine specimen of Vancouver Island elk, calling its mate from the underbrush.
