

Other larger transfers include the sale of the Merchants Bank building at Talbot and King streets, to Ceci Mann, for \$11,000; sale of a residence on Dufferin avenue, near Picton street, by Annie M. Strong to John R. Armstrong for \$10,000, and sale of a residence on the east side of Ridout street, near Fullarton street, by the estate of Sarah J. Green to Thomas F. Kingsmill, Junior, for \$15.000.
