

OFFICIALS THINK L. S. R. PRICE SET BY BECK TOO LOW

Fail To Reach Agreement in
the Street Railway
Tangle.

MAKE CONCESSIONS

Toronto, Oct. 30.—Progress toward an agreement regarding the price to be paid by the City of London for the London Street Railway was made this afternoon at the Parliament Buildings at a conference between representatives of the two parties, with the Ontario Cabinet also present in order to lend its good offices. No definite agreement, however, was reached, as the street railway authorities, Sir Adam Beck, considered their figures to be still too high to be submitted to the London ratepayers for their ratification. The way was left open for further negotiations, however, and while the Ontario Government has now definitely withdrawn from participation, it is anticipated that the conference between the railway and the city authorities will be resumed. The price which the London Street Railway asked for its property at the opening of the conference was close to two million dollars, while Sir Adam Beck, as arbitrator presenting the city of London's case, was willing to pay only slightly in excess of \$1,000,000. The railway company materially reduced its price during the negotiations.

Following the conference Premier Ferguson stated that at the coming session of the Ontario House legislation would have to be passed constraining legislation of 1921 which gave the London Street Railway power to raise its fare to five cents.

CANADIAN FLOUR IN GERMANY GIVES U.S. KEEN COMPETITION

Quality and Plan of Accepting Payment Is Meeting With Favor
—Report of Wheat Crop Unfavorable.

Washington, Oct. 30.—Canadian flour is giving United States flour sharp competition in the German market, partly because of its quality, but also in consequence of the fact that the Canadian mills are satisfied to accept payment in cash documents at Hamburg, whereas United States mills will only sell against sight draft in New York, says a report received by the United States department of agriculture from its commissioner in Berlin.

Flour importers in Germany, the report points out, are already handicapped by the depreciation of the mark, and find payment of sight drafts in New York an additional burden, in view of the fact that it means a percentage for the exchange brokers.

OPPOSE TEACHING MUSIC IN SCHOOLS OF INGERSOLL

Strong opposition, however, was offered, and the clause was eliminated before the report was adopted. The feeling of the majority of the members was that there were more urgent ways in which the money could be expended.

NEW C. N. "BOOSTER" ENGINE COMPLETES RECORD HAUL

Sarnia, Oct. 30.—With the return here tonight from a special freight run to Mimico and back, Canadian National officials announced a record haul achieved by engine 3455, one of the new type of "booster" locomotives of the Canadian National.

Leaving here for Mimico on Sunday night, the monster engine had 71 loaded cars of general freight behind. The weight of the train was 4,800 tons, compared with a previous record of 3,700 tons.

Returning, the engine brought 31 cars, some loaded and some empty. Engineer Whitaker reported that the running both ways was easy despite the heavy load.

reports of the German wheat crop, which has been much delayed, the report states. Another stimulating influence has been the desire of importers to get their foreign currency invested in flour so as to escape the effect of recent regulations governing the possession of foreign exchange.

Canadian flour, the agricultural commissioner reports, has lately obtained higher prices in Germany than United States flour because of its sharpness. The demand for Canadian flour in Germany has surprised the trade, because it has been thought it could find a market only in Czechoslovakia and Poland. Recently the Czechoslovakian government, to protect the native wheat crop and flour mills, prohibited the importation of flour into Czechoslovakia. Formerly Canadian flour passed into Czechoslovakia through Germany.

TWO BADLY BEATEN BY CHICKEN THIEVES

Fire When Surprised by Father and Son—Escape After Tussle.

Kitchener, Oct. 30.—Police are looking for the assailants of Charles Fisher and his son, who live on the Peterborough road, just outside the city limits. Fisher is suffering from severe scalp wounds, and his son, Reinhold, has an injured shoulder as a result of a combat with two chicken thieves, who were caught in the act of robbing Fisher's chicken pen just before dawn this morning.

The thieves made a getaway after a thrilling fight, in which fists and clubs played a prominent part. Fisher heard noises in his chicken pen and arousing his son, the two went into the yard. Fisher armed himself with a shotgun. The thieves when surprised first on Fisher and his son, who immediately rushed them and grappled with them. The shotgun fell to the ground. One thief grabbed it and pounded young Fisher across the back and shoulders with the stock, while the other struck the father over the head with the butt of his revolver.

The thieves then broke away and made their escape, leaving several chickens in a bag at the entrance to the pen.

BELIEVE STRONG BAND AIDS ALIEN SMUGGLING

Seven Slaves Caught by U. S. Officials As They Land At Lewiston.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Oct. 30.—Seven men, all natives of Yugoslavia, are held by American authorities on the charge that they tried to enter the United States illegally. They were arrested by Constable Gilbert Carter of Youngstown, as they landed on the riverbank below Lewiston from a boat that had brought them across the lower river from Canada. United States immigration authorities believe the men were smuggled in by the international band of alien smugglers that have been operating with much success along the Niagara border.

MODERN CHURCH HAS TENDENCY TO BECOME LAX

Sharp Criticism Directed At
Membership by One
Professor.

O.R.E.C. CONVENTION

Stratford, Oct. 30.—The tendency of the modern church to become lax in its restrictions on membership was strongly attacked by Prof. F. W. Kerr at the annual convention of the Ontario Religious Education Council in Central Methodist Church this evening.

The speaker, who is a professor of religious education, declared one of the greatest weaknesses of the modern church was that of receiving into its membership people who were spiritually barren and who had but a poor understanding of the Bible. There were too many church members whose idea of worship was to play golf on Sunday, he said.

CANADA DENIES GOLD BASIS ASSUMPTION

Imperial Conference Session
Overshadowed by Death of
Bonar Law.

London, Eng., Oct. 30.—The shadow of Bonar Law's death hung over the proceedings of the imperial conference today as it has overshadowed for the time being, the political campaign.

Two committees of the economic conference met. In one committee, the Darling scheme for the floating of empire currency bills was considered, but the objections to it were that it assumed that the countries of the empire were not currency-repelling, a gold basis. Both Canada and South Africa objected to any assumption that they would not return to a gold basis.

There was reference during the discussion to recent rumors of the inflation of British currency. The British representatives gave repeated assurance that Great Britain had not any intention to bring about inflation.

CAPITAL OF CANADA MOURNS LAW'S DEATH

Political Leaders of Dominion
Pay Tribute to Former
Premier.

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—The death of Bonar Law was mourned with deep sorrow in the Canadian capital. A Canadian born, he has always occupied a special place among British statesmen in the minds of the Canadian people. He was personally known, too, to many of the leading citizens of the Dominion and wherever he was known he won respect and friendship.

In view of the prime minister's presence in England, the acting premier, Rt. Hon. W. S. Fielding, gave out no official statement, but expressed his personal great regret at the death of Mr. Bonar Law and his sense of the great services which he had given to the British Empire.

Tributes to his character and his services to the empire were also paid by Sir Robert Borden, premier during the war, and by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader and former first minister.

ARREST A THIRD YOUTH IN AUTO THEFT CASE

Baulk hid in an outbuilding of the railroad station when he saw the officers arrive.

According to the police, Baulk had told of the hiding place of tobacco and cigarettes they are alleged to have stolen from a freight car in Stratford on Sunday night.

"The Queen and I sympathize with you and your family in the death of your dear father. We have equally felt for you during the saddest events of the past month. I always found Mr. Bonar Law a wise and capable counselor and a steadfast friend of thoroughness in his relations with him as a minister of the crown, and, finally as prime minister, I recognized that integrity, patriotism and single-heartedness which gained for him the confidence and respect of his fellows both at home and abroad."

SMITH RESIGNS POST AS HARBOR CHAIRMAN

Blames Action On Poor Support
Given Toronto
Commission.

Toronto, Oct. 30.—R. Home Smith, chairman of the Toronto Harbor Commission, of which body he has been a member for twelve years, announced tonight his resignation from the commission. The announcement was made at a dinner given to him by his colleagues on the commission, and members of the city council and transportation commission.

Mr. Smith said that his step was due to the fact that the harbor commissioners had not behind them a "solid public opinion, a united newspaper support and the unanimous backing of the city council." He said that all had been well until a year ago, since which time the board had been "with a condition of hyper-criticism with the result that our efforts of the past year have been of no avail and we are deadlocked."

The retiring chairman said that owing to the war, delay over the esplanade viaduct agreement, non-completion of the Welland Canal and circumstances over which the harbor board had no control, the harbor undertaking was not in the least antsy successful position it otherwise would have been in, but that he had absolute confidence in the future. The viaduct delay had embarrassed the commissioners' finances and caused the commission grave anxiety.

STRATFORD YOUNG LADIES MAKE RECORD WITH RIFLES

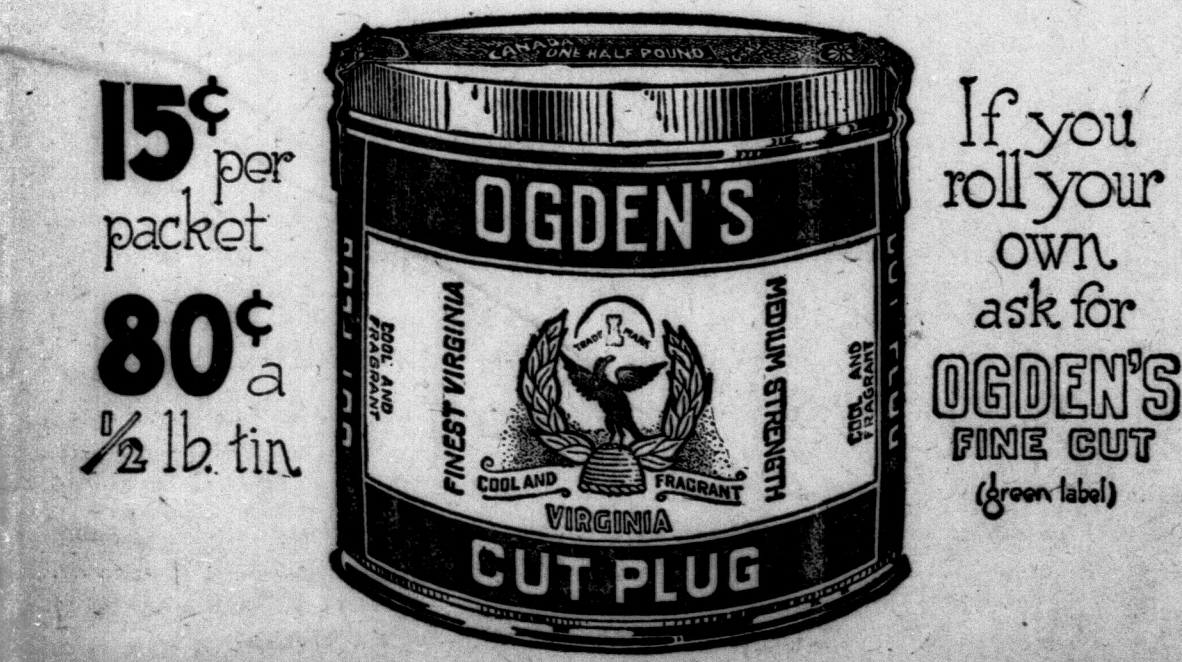
