They have gained six more seats in to-day's pollings, and have succeeded in defeating a Cabinet Minister, Mr. Ritchie, President of the Local Govern Parnellities I. The Irish Home Rule strength therefore, counting the Labor candidates and Irish Nationalists, anti-Parnellities and Parnellities with the Liberals, is 127 against the Tory-Liberal Unionist strength of 160 The Liberals have so far made a gain of 21 seats. The success in the Metropolitan boroughs to day was particularly inspiring, but, with the exception of Mr. Bailey, of North Chamferwell, none of the successful candidates has kept Irish Home Rule particularly to the front. Mr. Bailey has boldly assumed that Home Rule was the leading issue and the windows of his committee rooms have blazed with posters on the subject. One of these posters represented a red and green heart, united by the upotto "Home Rule." The successful Liberals in the metropolitan districts were elected chiefly on those local issues which Mrs Gladstone is accused of having 'neglected, and attention to which might have swept London for the Liberals. Sir John Colomb, for instance, was beaten in Bow and Bromley, largely because he hesitated to favor the taxation of ground rents.
