That publication, it was said, ligures that there will be 490,000,000 bushels in the winter and spring wheat crops. As its catimaae on the crop of 1893 was considered closer than any other given, some import-ance was attached to to day's report. Bartlett, Frazier & Co.'s Paris correspondent wrote them that the crop of France would be the largest on record for that country, and that there was very little chance of any purchases being made in this country for their account at the present range of value. Around the opening there was a decidedly good feeling coming from the large decrease in the amount of ocean passage (1, 192,000 bushels), from an advance at Liverpool and from the continued hot weather in the Northwest, with little, if any, indications of rain. The withdrawals of 323,046 bushels out of store attracted attention, as did like-wise a decrease of 960,000 bushels in the vis-ible supply.
