Cession of Territory Offends the National Pride of All Russia.

President Roosevelt Too Comes In for Some Unfriendly Criticism.

British and American Capitalists Held to Be the Chief Beneficiaries.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 31.—Judging from the press comment today on peace, it would appear that while pleased with the prospect of the cessation of further bloodshed in the Far East, a large portion of the public is unable to reconcile itself to the loss of territory, however insignificant. The national pride seems to be offended by the cession of part of the island of Sakhalin. Yesterday the people spoke of "the Russian manning peace. Many of the utterances show evidence of regret that the army had not been given another chance to try the fortunes of war. Though no one questions or doubts the humanity of the peace, it is followed by President Roosevelt, the plenipotentiaries and Emperor Nicholas, created by what they declare to be a dishonorable peace, the extreme patriots do not always refrain from criticizing President Roosevelt and the American people, who, they declare, have benefited Russian preparations, strength and ability to cope with the Japanese.
