EDITORS MAIL BAG

Campbellton, N.B.,

Editor Graphic,
Dear Sir:—

I have spoken to Dr. Pinault about a street crossing at corner of Adam and Roseberry Street. He promised me that he would give me a crossing over to north side of Roseberry street, where plank sidewalk is laid.

I told him to give me instead a short crossing mentioned above, also to extend past Andrews' blacksmith shop to cover up the filth and dirt from the drainage of the black smith shop, I also spoke to every councillor on the board about matter, and they promised to bring it up in meeting, but nothing has ever been done about it. I have since been given to understand by several councillors, that Councillor Pinault is wholly responsible for this state of affairs, and if this is the case, would the council bring pressure to bear on the Chairman of the Street Committee to have these disabilities rectified as soon as possible.

A most peculiar feature of this controversy is that Councillor Miller has secured the widening by several planks of the sidewalk on his side of the street from his office to his residence, and also to his store, being the whole length of Roseberry street. On the other side of the street we have to be content with the condition that nature provided us with. Mr. Richard Parker put a crossing in front of his store, paid for the deal and labor out of his own pocket, and I would have done the same, only that I expected something done by the Council after the promises given to me.

If, as I am lead to believe, Councillor Pinault is wholly responsible, a remedy can be provided when we go to the polls; in the meantime, would ask the Council to act as a whole in the matter, and put in some decent crossings. We also like the assistance of the Board of Health regarding the drainage from Andrews' black smith shop.
