PROVINCIAL BANK SHOWS PROSPEROUS FINANCIAL YEAR

The preliminary statement for the fiscal year ended June 30th shows that the bank's total obligations to the public are \$28,594,720, and total liabilities \$31,693,379, being an increase of over ten million dollars on the previous statement. The bank is in a very strong liquid position, the quick assets amounting to \$22,555,000, which amount is about the same as its deposits due to the public amounting to \$22,489,456. Of the quick assets, cash resources amount to \$8,254,720, while Dominion Government, British and foreign securities amount to \$8,216,000 and call and short term investments amount to \$6,124,280. The bank is also showing an amount of \$4,240,191, etc.
The net profits are \$454,594, of which the sum of \$250,000 was transferred to reserve fund, which has now reached the sum of one million dollars, being fifty per cent. of its paid up capital of two million dollars.
The net profits of \$454,594 represent a total for 18 months as the bank's fiscal year now ends June 30th. The net profits for the previous year 1917 of twelve months were \$207,000, therefore by adding one half this amount for a presumed six months additional profit a total of \$310,500 is obtained for purposes of comparison with this year's profits. Therefore if the above amount is subtracted from this year's profits a very handsome increase of \$144,000 is shown over the previous year. The annual meeting of the shareholders will take place at noon on the 13th of August next.

Peace Day, Saturday, July 19th, having been proclaimed a public holiday by the Federal authorities, the day was generally observed in Campbellton, practically all places of business with the possible exception of a number of grocery stores closing for the day.
A proclamation was issued by His Worship Mayor Murray requesting citizens to observe the day as such, in a manner befitting the occasion, by the display of flags and bunting throughout the town and the simultaneous ringing of bells and blowing of whistles for a period of five minutes commencing at 12 o'clock noon.
Long before the noon hour the town took on a regular holiday attire, hardly a home within the town's limits but was displaying flags and bunting, giving a most pleasing and attractive appearance to our town.

At twelve o'clock noon all public bells and steam whistles started to peep forth their joyful melody in commemoration of that fact that the greatest war in the world's history had been brought to a close and peace proclaimed. Just previous to the ringing of the bells and the blowing of whistles the Campbellton Citizens band rendered several appropriate selections on Water Street, opposite the G.W.V.A. rooms.

At nine o'clock in the evening the members of the G.W.V.A. met at their rooms in full uniform and headed by the Citizens band marched up Water street to the depot square where a huge bon fire was brightly burning. No particulars have as yet, been received.

SPECIAL MEETING OF CO. COUNCIL

Addington Assessment Taken Up and Big Cut Ordered.
A special session of the Restigouche Municipal Council was held in the Council Chamber, Dalhousie, Tuesday, July 23, a full attendance of councillors being present.
The day was spent in committee work, but about three o'clock the committee having the Addington Assessment matter in hand reported recommending that the Addington District No. 2 assessment be reduced from \$38,29,20 to \$11,079.39. This report was after considerable discussion adopted.
It will be remembered that when the warrant for the Addington Assessment was received here, Council discovered that the Town of Campbellton had been improperly assessed \$364,181 for the year of 1919. He immediately took the matter up and had that amount struck from the Town's assessment, but it was improperly added to Dist. No. 2 Addington.
This has now been remedied, at considerable expense to the county and the amount so cut off will be paid by each of the parishes.
The seed grain accounts were also up and after a lot of talk were adjusted.

DEATH OF PTE. W. LATURNEAU

Died at Military Hospital at Toronto—Military Funeral Here.

Pte. Walter Laturneau, whose death occurred at the Toronto Military Hospital on July 9th, enlisted on November 28th, 1915 with the 104th Battalion and later transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles, going overseas in July 1916.
In August 1917 at Hill 70 he was severely wounded having one thigh broken with shrapnel and the other leg so badly wounded that it was necessary to amputate.
He was for some time at the Canadian Hospital, London, later at Buxton and then returned to Canada in June 1918, where he was an inmate at the St. John Hospital and also at the Frederick Military Hospital and later at Toronto.
Pte. Laturneau, who was improving daily was expected home for a few weeks leave, when word came that he was seriously ill and a short while after of his death, as above stated. No particulars have as yet, been received.

Brought Back From Northern Russia Will Be Buried Here.

The body of Capt. O. A. Mowat, M.C. who was wounded in Northern Russia on December 16th, dying in hospital a day or two later, was carried back to England by the battery of which he was a member, and forwarded to his home here via Montreal. Mr. M. M. Mowat took charge and brought it to Campbellton, arriving Tuesday morning.
A military funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2.30 at St. Andrew's church.

HOUSING SCHEME BEFORE COUNCIL

Committee Appointed to Look into Working of Scheme and Report Later.

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening in the town council chamber. His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair and all councillors present.
Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed, after which the town clerk read the official result of voting on Monday last, the result of which will be found in another column.
A communication was read from J. B. Jackson, Clerk of the N. B. Exco. relating the council's attention to the importance and necessity of knowing just where explosives were stored in our town, and suggesting the fire department be made aware of the places where such explosives were stored. Also suggesting the passing of by-laws governing same. Referred to by-laws and Legislation Committee.

A communication was read from J. R. Messieu, Chatham. This was in reply to a letter from the town clerk asking the council to consider the services of the late Captain Mowat's new account up system. The service cost was about \$125, books about \$100.
A petition was read from L. Good, for a pool table license. Referred to the council on, and Rochester street. Referred to Police and Licensing Committee.

Councillor Devereux read a report covering the work of the police force during the past six months. The report was a most creditable one. Fines for the amount of \$1,722 had been received, a large amount of taxes had been collected by the police. During the six months 69 arrests had been made and 23 summons served.
The monthly accounts were ordered paid.

Councillor Jamieson, Chairman of the Public Property and Streets Committee was given an extension of time to report on the various petitions which had been referred to his department for consideration.
A communication was read from Mr. Howard, freight agent, with reference to an old claim of some \$495 for freight on coal. On motion the Chairman of the Electric Light Committee and the town clerk were instructed to meet with Mr. Howard and have the matter fully gone into.
The town clerk was then taken up, upon which there was much discussion. A Committee consisting of Councillors McKay, Matthews and Laram were appointed to meet with the town auditor and discuss and arrange appropriate conditions safeguarding the town against loss where money was loaned applicants, this committee to report back to council.
Council then adjourned.
