the fork, as used for table purposes, is during the reign of Edward II, when a certain priest, one of Edward's favorites, is reported as having among his effects sixty-nine alliver spoons and three forks. Queen Clemence, of Hungary, in 1328, possessed thirteen spoons and one fork; and Queen Anne, of Bourbon, had one of gold which was inherited by Charles V., king of France, who himself owned seven or eight, according to an inventory made in 1380.

The silverware of Chancellor Duprat, which an expert declared to be worth £33,848—a considerable amount in those days (1536)—included only one fork, while it contained two dozen spoons. The Prince of Conde is recorded as possessing a fork coated with gold, which was reserved exclusively for his own use. The first inventory in which a number of forks are mentioned to that of Gabrielle d'Estres (1599). It includes twenty, of which eight were made of silver, the others being of iron with coral handles. But these forks were used only for toasting bread, and Gabrielle, like the rest of the world, ate with her fingers.

The introduction of forks for table service at first provoked ridicule and scandal. A curieus pamphlet attacking the minions of Henry III., says: "In the first place they never touch meat with their fingers, but use forks, which they raise up to the mouth while stretching out the neck. They eat their salad with forks, for it is forbidden to touch meat with the fingers, no matter how difficult it may be, and they prefer touching their lips with this little instrument than their fingers." Thomas Coryat, in his travels on the continent in 1608, which were published in 1611 under the title of "Crudities," says: "I observed a custom in all those Italian cities and towns through which I passed that is not used in any other country that I saw in my travels, neither do I think that any other nation of Christendom doth use it, but only Italy. The Italians, and also most strangers that are commorant in Italy, do always at their meat.
