The main facts elicited were that the driver had never been over this branch of the road, that he had been advised his train might stop at the station, which was not the case, and that he was running at a rate of twelve miles an hour and was unable to see the other train, in time to stop, so swift was his speed and so sharp the curve, and that he had had a pilot if he had had for one.

The jury brought in a verdict stating the circumstances and a full result of the collision and adding their belief that the driver was not being negligent.
