Incorporation Articles of Uncle Sam's New Organization Signed—A strong list of signers.

New York, Feb. 9.—The new jockey club has at last been organized and named. It will be known simply as the Jockey Club.

Articles of incorporation were drawn up yesterday afternoon and forwarded to the Secretary of State at Albany, and within a few days the new club will be legally incorporated body.

Among those who signed the articles of incorporation yesterday were William C. Whitney, Col. O. H. Payne, F. K. Sturges, Perry Belmont, Col. W. P. Thompson, J. B. Haggin, John Hunter, J. Cassatt, James Galvin and Dr. G. L. Knapp.

The following were named as stewards of the Jockey Club for 1894: Messrs. August Belmont, J. R. Keese, John Hunter, Col. W. P. Thompson, J. O. Donner, F. K. Sturges and Dr. G. L. Knapp.

The policy adopted by the English jockey club having a superior standard of ability, jockey or ill-fitting and will be followed.

The club will publish a studbook or book for registry of horses in the United States and Canada, to promote the best exhibition of such horses generally for the purpose of improving the breed of horses.

Johanne Goldast Kills His Owner. Mr. E. K. Weaver, a Buffalo lawyer, the principal owner, Johanne Goldast, a German, was killed in a runaway accident in Buffalo this week. It appears that Mr. Weaver and Miss Looney, the latter of Buffalo, were out for a ride at Buffalo when Goldast, who was frightened and turned around suddenly, throwing the occupants to the center of the road. The lady fell in the snow and was not injured, but Mr. Weaver clung to the lines and was dashed against a tree. The blow rendered him unconscious and from which he never recovered. He was taken to the hospital and died on Feb. 10. He was the property for some time of Mr. Thomas Tor, who sold him to Weaver. He was a very valuable horse and was always easily frightened and very unmanageable when thoroughly scared.
