Edmonton Bulletin, July 22. Colin Fraser, trader, of Chipewyan, gold to R. Secord on Friday the largest lot of fur ever brought into Edonton. The price paid was \$20,000. The lot was not only large, but the fur was of extra fine quality. It included 36 silver foxes, 78 cross foxes, 124 red foxes, 41 fisher, 72 otter, 812 beaver, 23 wolverine, 106 bear, 3016 marten, 582 mink, 115 slynx, 7 wolf, 3100 rat and 48 pounds of castorum. The unusual abundance of marten this year, with the comparatively high price at which they sell, adds greatly to the figures of the fur trade this season. Of silver foxes, which are always a rarity, were almost perfectly black and of course would be particularly valuable on that account. The silver, frequently called the black, fox, is about the same size and build as a red fox. The general color is black, except a white tip on the end of the tail. But on the hind quarters there is a greater of less proportion of white hairs scatter ed amongst the black, giving a silvery er the number of these white hairs the less valuable the fur and the less the number the more valuable. A pelt of perfectly black fur, if in good condi tion, is worth a fabulous sum in Russia, where the silver fox is the distinguished fur worn by nobility and
