MARK TWAIN'S CABIN IN NEVADA DESERT

In a lonely gulch in Nevada's desolate desert region stands one of America's most interesting literary relics—the old cabin of the late Samuel Langhorne Clemens, better known as Mark Twain. It is situated in a place called Aurora, which boasts of a population of a score or so, mostly old men. It was here that Mark Twain lived and toiled and starved while he evolved "Roughing It." But for the cheerful spirit of the humorist, who originally helped to put it on the map, its entire population would doubtless long since have wandered into oblivion.

In his ramblings Twain never passed by a good-looking tin of fruit with a bright label, and in a corner of the cabin, carefully covered, he had a pile of them. At meal-times, especially if he saw anyone passing, he would nonchalantly toss two or three out of the window. The natural assumption was that he was preparing his regular feast, and while he actually subsisted on sparse crusts the populace envied him his supposedly well-stocked larder. In those days a square meal was a luxury to Mark Twain, but his pride never deserted him, and none knew when he hungered.


