

A commercial treaty between France and Belgium had been signed. The Archbishop of Tours, in a letter to the minister of justice, says that the temporal power of the Pope is abolished, and that the Catholic world will hold Louis Napoleon responsible for it. Garibaldi had moved to Capri. Large bodies of Italian troops had embarked at Genoa for Southern Italy, and 3,000 had reached Naples. Victor Emmanuel was about to visit Naples. The ex-king of Naples had left Rome for Villa Albano. The official journal of Rome denies that Sardinia has made conciliatory proposals to Rome. Austria.—The Upper House had voted an address in response to the speech from the throne. A large vote is to be asked to increase the Austrian navy and the ministry of marine is to be created. ITALY AND POLAND.—There has been a debate in the House of Lords on Italian affairs, in which Earl Derby took part, and his speech is interpreted to mean that he is bidding for office. Lord John Russell's Italian policy was distasteful to Lord Derby, and this fact has operated powerfully towards keeping the Tories from becoming advisers to the Queen. Lord Derby has come to see this, and so he tells Parliament and the country not to fear that he and his friends would betray the cause of Italian independence in the event of their being called to the helm of affairs. You will have noticed that the Italian Parliament has been the scene of an exciting drama, in which Garibaldi, Cavour, and Bixio have been the chief actors. The question at issue is the reconstruction of the army; in other words, whether there shall be a volunteer as well as a regular army. Fanti is for preserving the nucleus of a volunteer force, which means immediate war. The various points involved in this question, retrospective as well as prospective, were hotly discussed for two days in the Chamber of Deputies, amid the most exciting scenes. There was a revival of the old quarrel between Garibaldi and Cavour, in which the former spoke with great violence and injustice, and the latter was provoked to designate the Liberator "a bad citizen." These recriminations brought General Bixio upon the scene, and his conciliatory appeals evoked passion and to some extent restored concord, as well as enabled Count Cavour to make explanations that disarmed his antagonist. The Statesman (and the soldier came to a better understanding, and the decision of the Chambers was eventually in favor of the tentative proposals of the Government. This quarrel has, however, created a schism between the army and volunteers, which the subsequent correspondence between Garibaldi and Cavour is not calculated to heal. But, after all, these differences are of the nature of lovers' quarrels; and there can be little doubt that, in the presence of the critical state of national affairs, the discord will soon be hushed. Reaction pursues its course unchecked throughout Poland. The patriots whom the Russian Governor made use of to preserve order have been put aside, now that an irresistible military force has been concentrated in Warsaw. The national movement is being "put down" on every side; and there is no longer any pretense that tangible concessions will be made to the Poles. A fear that these repressive measures will precipitate an insurrection has probably suggested the article in the *Monteur* which declares that the Emperor Napoleon has no disposition to encourage hopes he cannot satisfy. Poland must not look for external help. More will be gained to the national cause, though it be but slowly, by quiet agitation and self-discipline than by premature outbreaks.

UNITED STATES.

Washington, May 9.—The repairs on all the bridges are completed except the iron bridges at the Northern Relay House, and one between Cockeysville and Ashland; these were expected to be finished to-night, and a train is announced to leave Harrisburg for Washington to-morrow.

Baltimore, May 9.—Several British vessels, consigned to Norfolk, are in this port waiting orders, being prevented from entering Norfolk by reason of the blockade.

Washington, May 10.—The treasury has now ample means in specie for all necessities. They had this morning between two and three millions dollars in the vaults. There are offers of loans to any extent already exceeding \$50,000,000. Nearly all are at par and some fully up.

It is definitely ascertained that commissioned navy officers have gone to Europe for the purpose of buying steamers and other vessels for the United States Government.

There are some 8,000 federal troops under arms, commanded by F. P. Blair, jr., in defense of St. Louis.

Gen. Beauregard, with Mr. Russell of the *London Times* had arrived at Montgomery on the 8th inst.

The Government has now parties in nearly every Southern State who keep them thoroughly advised of everything that is going on.

The N. Y. *Times* has advised per the Kedar, that the secessionists have a battery of 68 pounders at the mouth James River.

The tents of the secession forces, lining the whole bank of the river are distinctly seen from the ramparts of Fort Monroe.

Flour at Richmond \$10; pork \$30 per barrel. People very poor, banks broken, business prostrated, and no money to be had. Virginia and Carolina bonds worth 25c on the dollar.

\$1,000,000 in specie passed through Annapolis for Washington yesterday. It is calculated that at least 300,000 volunteers have tendered their services to the Government, and of the large number of troops here but few are in the hospital.

Boston, May 10.—A company of volunteers, of Woodstock, New Brunswick, have offered their services to join the company raising at Houlton, Me., for the defense of the Union.

The Tribune's correspondent says the people of Tennessee are to vote in July next on the question of secession. The struggle for the Union promises to be close and desperate, and may end in civil war between the traitors and the true men.

Baton, May 11.—An attempt has been made to cut the Cochrane water from the city, by breaking open the main conduit, near Newton's lower falls. The attempt was unsuccessful, the mason work being too strong for the implements used.

Washington, May 11.—The Virginia rebels are fortifying their positions at Harper's Ferry, and are leaving no available point unrequited.

There is considerable force at that place already, and reinforcements are reported as constantly arriving from the direction of Richmond.

Secretary Cameron has received advice from General Sherman that 5,000 troops at Harper's Ferry, half without arms.

A lot of horses and cattle on cars en route for Baltimore were taken by the Virginia troops near Harper's Ferry to-day.

The Union feeling in Western Virginia is daily growing stronger. Considerable cotton has accumulated at Old Point Comfort, which has been taken from the decks of the rebel vessels.

Baltimore, May 11.—By an arrival from Old Point Comfort we learn that that post is now fully prepared to resist any attack.

Six steamers were off Fort Monroe enforcing a blockade.

The steamer Yankee pursued an armed schooner on Thursday up York River, but after proceeding a short distance was fired upon from a concealed battery and compelled to return.

Four steamers of the Aquia creek line, recently seized by the Federal Government, are cruising on the Potomac, all heavily armed.

Southern troops are concentrating in the vicinity of Norfolk. The Virginians have now five batteries erected in Norfolk harbor.

New York, May 11.—Nashville papers of the 8th, state that the Governor of Tennessee and the Legislature have committed that State to an armed rebellion.

Washington, May 11.—The Cabinet has decided to sustain the Union in Virginia, Tennessee, and Missouri, with a prompt and efficient force.

Montgomery papers state that Jefferson Davis, dinner at the White House, Washington, is postponed till the 10th of June.

Several prominent New Yorkers at Washington raised \$15,000 to purchase arms for the Virginia Unionists.

The Nashville Banner of the 8th says a vessel arrived at New Orleans on Monday, from Europe, with a quarter of a million stand of arms for the Confederate States.

The President directs the Commander of the U. S. forces on the Florida coast, to permit no person to exercise any office or authority upon the islands of Key West, the Tortugas or Spanish Key, which may be inconsistent with the laws and constitution of the United States prohibiting him at the same time if he shall find it necessary, to suspend there the writ of *habeas corpus* and to remove from the vicinity of the United States fortresses all dangerous or suspected persons.

The Secretary of the Treasury advertises for proposals for the remainder of the stock of the United States, issued under the Act of February, amounting to \$9,000,000.

New York, May 13.—A Montreal firm offers to take \$1,000,000 Treasury notes at par.

The *World's* Washington correspondent states that an attempt was discovered to poison the troops. It appears that some sugar was used which contained arsenic when purchased.

A Washington dispatch states that the President, accompanied by Secretary Seward and others, took a tour of inspection down the Potomac.

There are now in Washington, or in sight, about 31,000 men.

Preparations are being completed for effectually blockading Virginia waters. Capt. Pendergast has given notice of fifteen days for all vessels to leave the port of that State with or without cargoes.

Washington, May 13.—In addition to the Government vessels, about 20 armed steamers from Baltimore, New York and Philadelphia, are being put in readiness for blockading.

New York, May 13.—A dispatch from a government agent reports that the rebels occupy the Virginia and also the Maryland side, and were apprehensive of an attack from the Federal forces.

A wagon load of military goods, bound to Harper's Ferry, was seized on the Frederick road last night by the troops.

The Tribune's special dispatch says: Agents who had been sent from Gen. Scott's office, to reconnoitre in the South, are daily returning, and all agree that there were bodies of men at Richmond, Lynchburg, Montgomery, New Orleans, and Pensacola. They all agree, too, that the troops intend marching on Washington, and that if that plan was abandoned, the leaders will find it difficult to restrain the men.

The United States government has purchased the steamship Atlantic, and it is conjectured that she will be used to transport large bodies of troops designed to make sudden hostile demonstrations against exposed points on the Southern Coast.

Baltimore, May 14.—The correspondent of the American accompanied the members of the Legislature to Harper's Ferry. He says the Virginians have strongly fortified the Maryland Heights overlooking Harper's Ferry, and are very confident, and evidently have no intention of evacuating their position. On Sunday 7,000 stand of arms, Minnie muskets and 12 cannon, arrived.

Washington, May 14.—A special dispatch to the Post says, no change will be made in command of the fleet off Pensacola. It is regarded as not improbable that a Federal force will march from Wheeling to Martinsburg, Va., and take Harper's Ferry in the rear.

COLORADO VOLUNTEERS.—The regiment of colored volunteers which offered its services to the government was composed of Canadian fugitives mainly. The offer was made by a person formerly in the diplomatic service of the United States, who was willing to take command of a brigade composed of ten companies, the majority of whom are runaway negroes. As the proposition was seriously made it was necessary to return a serious answer, which was that under no circumstances whatever would the government listen to any such proposition. —*Detroit Advertiser*, 15th.

SOLD TO THE UNITED STATES.—The Canadian steamer *Peerless* has been sold to the United States government for war purposes, and is now being put in running order at Toronto. She is to be delivered in New York, and will leave this week under British colors via Quebec and Halifax. She is an iron steamer of light draft, built after the best British models. The price paid is \$40,000.

FAMINE IN PROSPECT.—The Savannah (Ga.) Republican says, "The suspension of intercourse with the North has created quite a stir in our provision market for some days past. Everything nearly has gone up to starvation prices. Flour is selling at \$11 to \$12, corn from \$1 15 to \$1 25, oats \$1 50, hay \$2 to \$2 25, beef, pork, and mutton 15 to 18c, and nearly everything else in proportion.

LOCAL MATTERS.

Suffolk.—During the week ending May 10th, the following was shipped from Hull's landing: 3,000 bushels of oats and 274 bushels of rye.

IMPORTANT TO PARTY HOLDERS.—The Court of Revision is adjourned to the 27th of May, for the benefit of persons who may wish to apply to obtain relief from disqualification in property assessment. We understand that a party who had been undervalued, made application to the last Court of Revision, held on the tenth, and his assessment was raised to \$200. There are others probably suffering the same injustice, who may secure their rights. Electors look to your interests.
