in, that their debts to the dealers with them may be paid, their wives and children cloathed, and their credit supported.

It is neither gaming nor debauchery that disable them from the payment of their debts, but their vanity, which is excessive, in the presents of peltry they make to other favages, who come either in quality of envoys from one country to another, or as friends or relations upon a visit to one another. Then it is, that a village is fure to exhaust itself in presents; it being a standing rule with them, on the arrival of such persons, to bring out every thing that they have acquired, during the winter and spring-season, in order to give the best and most advantageous idea of themselves. Then it is chiefly they make feafts, which fometimes last several days; of the manner of which I should perhaps spare you the description, if the ceremony that attends them did not include the strongest attestation of the great stress they lay on hunting; the excell-
