BETTING AND POOL SELLING.

MR. BLAKE'S ACT.

The following is Mr. Blake's Act for the re-

pression of botting and pool selling:—

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :—

1. In case any person uses or knowingly allows any part of any promises under his control to be used for the purpose of recording or registering any bet or wager, or selling any pool,

(2.) Keeps, exhibits, or employs, or know ingly allows to be kept, exhibited, or employed, in any part of any premises under his control, any device or apparatus, for the purpose of re-cording or registering any bet or weger or sell-

ing any pool, or—
(3.) Becomes the custodian or depositary of any money, property, or valuable thing staked, wagered, or pledged, or—

(4.) Records or registers any bet or wager, or ells any pool;—

ells any pool;—
Upon the result (a) of any political or municipal election, or (b) of any race, or (c) of any contest or trial of skill or endurance of man or

extend to any person by reason of his becoming the custodian or depositary of any money, property or valuable thing staked, to be paid to the winner of any lawful race, sport, game, or exercise, or to the owner of any horse engaged in any lawful race.

3. The provisions of the Act thirty-two and thirty three Victoria, chapter thirty-two. 1111tuled: "An Act respecting the prompt and summary administration of justice in certain cases," shall apply to cases arising under this Act.
