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

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

SEALED TENDERS for the supply for the Permanent Force and Active Militia, for Necessaries, Barrack Stores, and Camp Equipment, consisting of Boots, Socks, Underclothing, Shirts, Razors, Brushes, etc.; Rugs, Sheets, Corn Brooms, etc.; Blankets, Waterproof Sheets, Marquises; Saddlery and Nunnahs, will be received up to noon, Friday, 8th of May, 1896. The Tenders are to be marked on the left hand corner of the envelope, "Tender for Militia Store Supplies," and are to be addressed to the undersigned.

The contract for Boots is to cover a period of three years from the 1st July, 1896, those for Necessaries, Barrack Stores, and Camp Equipment are for one year from 1st July, 1896.

Printed forms of tender containing full particulars may be obtained from the Department at Ottawa, at the offices of the District Paymasters at London, Toronto, Kingston, Montreal, Quebec, St. John, N.B., and Winnipeg, Man., and the office of the Deputy Adjutant General of Military District No. 9, Halifax.

Every article of Necessaries, Barrack Stores, etc., to be furnished, as well as the material therein must be manufactured in Canada, and similar in every respect to the sealed pattern thereof, which may be seen at the office of the undersigned at Ottawa. This does not apply to material for saddlery. Neither sealed patterns, nor samples, will be sent to parties desiring to tender.

No tender will be received unless made on a printed form furnished by the Department, nor will a tender be considered if the printed form is altered in any manner whatever.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted Chartered Canadian Bank cheque, payable to the order of the Honourable, the Minister of Militia and Defence, for an amount equal to ten per cent. of the total value of the articles tendered for, which will be forfeited if the party making the tender declines to sign a contract when called upon to do so. If the tender is not accepted, the cheque will be returned. The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Miss H. Johnston has left £2,056 11s. 5d. for charities in Peterhead or Aberdeenshire.

Dr. Alexander, late Bishop of Derry, was enthroned at Armagh lately as Lord Primate of Ireland.

The Turiff Free Presbytery has resolved to petition Parliament in favour of the Local Veto Bill. Members expressed themselves pretty strongly.

A fine monument of Kenmay granite is to be erected by his fellow missionaries on the grave of the Rev. J. A. Wylie, the martyr missionary of Liaoyang, China.

A petition has been signed by 253 members and adherents of the missionary church at New Lanark in favour of the ordination of the Rev. J. French, at present missionary there.

The Venerable Principal Brown, D.D. of the Free Church College, Aberdeen, although in his ninety-second year, presided at the close of the session lately. He offered up the opening prayer, and a lecture on "Zwinglianism," which he had prepared, was read by Professor Robertson.

At the Second Presbyterian Church, Armagh, the Moderator of the General Assembly (the Rev. Dr. Buick) conducted special services on Sabbath, 15th ult., as also a special service on Monday evening in the Temple Church, Keady. Liberal collections were made at both places for the removal of debt on the several churches.

Dr. Dawson Burns contributed recently to *The Times*, London, Eng., an admirable letter on the nation's drink bill for 1895. The bill shows an increase of £3,676,984 over the figures for 1894, the huge total for 1895 being £142,414,812. It may be noted that this increase of drink expenditure is more than double the annual income of all the missionary societies of the nation.

Soon, if we do not take heed, says the Superior, Wis., *Leader*, "the little Dominion of Canada, with a population only a little greater than that of the state of New York, will outstrip the entire United States in providing transportation from hemisphere to hemisphere. Nothing goes further in bringing capital and developing the country than ample transportation facilities."

GRENVILLE CANAL ENLARGEMENT.

SECTIONS A AND B.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned, and endorsed "Tenders for Grenville Canal Enlargement," will be received at this office until noon on Saturday, 9th May, 1896, for the enlarging of about 13 miles of the Grenville Canal.

Plans and specifications of the work can be seen at the office of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, at Ottawa, or at the Superintending Engineer's Office, Montreal, where forms of tenders can be obtained on and after Thursday, 9th April, 1896.

In cases of firms there must be attached the actual signatures of the full name, and the nature of the occupation, and place of residence of each member of the same, and further, an accepted bank cheque for the sum of \$5,000 must accompany the tender; this accepted cheque must be endorsed over to the Minister of Railways and Canals, and will be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for work at the rates and on the terms stated in the offer submitted. The accepted cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted.
