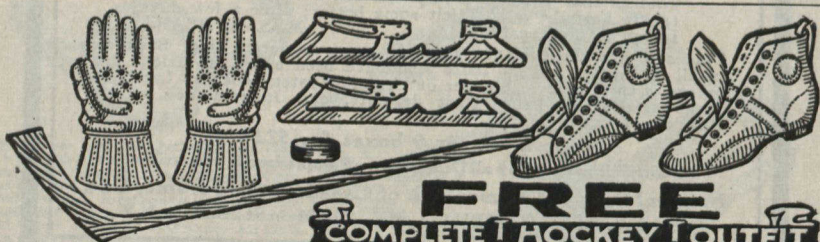

No. 9577. Boy's Suit, 2 to 6 years. For the 4-year size will be needed, 2¾ yards of material 36 inches wide. Price 10 cents.

No. 9514. Evening Dress for Misses and Small Women, 16 and 18 years. For the 16-year size will be needed, 5 yards of material 44 inches wide for the dress, ¾ yard 36 for the lining or foundation. Price 15 cents.

No. 9503. Coat Dress for Misses and Small Women, 16 and 18 years. For the 16-year size will be needed 3¾ yards of material 44 inches wide, with ¾ yard for the collar and cuffs. Price 15 cents.

No. 9534. Girl's Dress, 6 to 12 years. For the 10-year size will be needed, 2 yards of plain material 44 inches wide and 1½ yards of plaid, with ¾ yard 35 for the collar. Price 15 cents.
