Hon. C. M. Drury (Minister of Industry): Mr. Speaker, I am sure the automobile industry will be glad to have the advice of the right hon. Leader of the Opposition—

An hon. Member: Don't get smart.

Mr. Drury: —but I should point out to him that since the lower sales which occurred in the second quarter of this year on the domestic market, sales of the current year models this fall are very brisk indeed.

Mr. Starr: Is that why thousands of people are being laid off?

Mr. Drury: This is no doubt a result of a further narrowing in the differential between the two countries.

Mr. Diefenbaker: Mr. Speaker, I ask the minister whether it is a fact that Canadian manufacturers, with the \$50 million bonus they got from this government, are selling in the United States at a competitive price, cars which have been manufactured in Canada? In other words, are they selling at similar prices?

Mr. Drury: I am sorry, Mr. Speaker, I did not quite hear that question.

Mr. Diefenbaker: Did the Prime Minister say "ridiculous"?

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. This is developing into a debate between the two hon. members, which is not the purpose of the question period.

If it is true that the government wants to centralize the services dispensed by the unemployment insurance offices, can the minister tell us whether this policy will apply to the whole of Canada, or only to the province of Quebec?

Hon. J. R. Nicholson (Minister of Labour): Mr. Speaker, there has been no attempt on the part of the government to consolidate unemployment insurance offices. The Unemployment Insurance Commission is a body set up by parliament itself. In the interests of efficiency and because of the change in the work load, certain changes are being made by the commission which apply in offices in all parts of Canada.
