As the procedure authorizing employers to make the deductions must still be negotiated before it can be put into place, I urge the companies involved to facilitate this payroll deduction plan. I also urge the employers to rise to the challenge offered by their employees, by matching their contributions.

I would further suggest that the federal Government follow this initiative by entering into discussions with its employees in order to create a plan which would provide the same possibilities for federal government employees.

DEFIANCE OF LAW CONDEMNED

CANADA POST CORPORATION

IMPROVED DOOR-TO-DOOR DELIVERY IN YORK-SCARBOROUGH

Mr. W. Paul McCrossan (York-Scarborough): Mr. Speaker, I have reviewed *Hansard* for this session of Parliament and could find not one single statement or question complimentary to Canada Post Corporation.

On March 19, 1985, I raised with the Minister responsible for the Post Office the fact that the Post Office appeared to

have abandoned its service standard of establishing door-todoor postal delivery when a new subdivision or apartment was more than 75 per cent occupied, and when the streets were paved.

Subsequently the Minister arranged for the President of Canada Post to meet with Members of Parliament who were experiencing difficulty in obtaining new door-to-door delivery. In addition, I was able to meet with Bob McGarry, President of the Letter Carriers Union of Canada. Together we were able to identify some 3,300 residences in York-Scarborough which should qualify for door-to-door service. I am pleased to report today that just over 60 per cent of these residences will receive door-to-door delivery next week, as a result of the reassignment of letter carriers from southern Scarborough to northern Scarborough.

I would like to thank both Michael Warren and Bob McGarry for their co-operation in agreeing to these route changes.

Sixty per cent is a passing grade in high school, but just barely. I look forward to meeting with Mr. Warren personally over the next couple of weeks to discuss extending door-to-door delivery to the remaining residences which meet the service standard, as well as to discuss reversing the dramatic decline in service in several of the small business corridors in my riding.

HISTORIC EVENTS

COMMEMORATION OF HOLOCAUST'S ENDING

Hon. Warren Allmand (Notre-Dame-de-Grâce-Lachine East): Mr. Speaker, as other colleagues have already stated, yesterday several thousand Canadians, mostly Jews, gathered in Ottawa to remember the six million victims murdered in the Nazi Holocaust. These six million murders took place throughout Europe in a large number of camps, the most horrifying at Buchenwald, Dachau, Auschwitz, Birkenau, and Treblinka. They are a terrifying reminder of how low man can sink in his treatment of fellow human beings. When Dachau was liberated forty years ago, it held over 30,000 victims.

The purpose of the meeting taking place in Ottawa and around the world is to remind younger and older generations of exactly what happened, so that it will never happen again. The world must be eternally vigilant so that similar incidents will never be repeated.

The plaque at the exit to the Dachau Museum quoting the philosopher and poet, George Santayana, reads as follows:

Those who cannot remember the past are doomed to repeat it.
