CANADA-UNITED STATES FREE TRADE AGREEMENT—POSITION OF NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CONSUMERS OF QUÉBEC

Mr. Dave Dingwall (Cape Breton—East Richmond): Mr. Speaker, according to the National Association of Consumers of Quebec, the free trade agreement is a lemon. Marie Vezina, the spokesperson for this group, told *La Presse* that they had used statistics and trade numbers from the Department of Finance as a basis for their research. They came to the conclusion that the Mulroney trade deal is bad for Canada, especially with respect to electricity, hydro, tariffs and telephone services.
