Dear Sir:

I am directed by the Executive Committee of the National Committee for the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation to inform you that the Committee invites the cooperation of the University in order to make the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee a success throughout Canada.

It would be greatly appreciated if you would bring the matter to the attention of the Faculty and students of your University and ask for their assistance in connection with the celebrations in their own localities.

I am further directed to say that the Committee places at the disposal of your University, for competition during the present academic year, a set of Confederation medals, viz: one gold, one silver, and one bronze. If possible, the Committee would like to have Canadian history, in special reference to the Confederation era and to the subsequent development of Canada, as the subject of such
