In becoming a member of the League of tions Canada subscribed to Article XXV. the Covenant, which reads as follows:

"The members of the League agree to encourage and promote the estab-lishment and co-operation of duly lishment authorized voluntary National Red Cross organizations, having as purposes the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world."

For this reason the Red Cross did not spend its work after the war as it did ter the South African war, but secured om Parliament in 1919 an amendment to charter to enable it to carry out its new d additional duties. One revelation of the r was the shockingly poor condition of e men of the British Empire. In Canada dical examinations found 181,229 out of 1.605 draftees under the Military Service t, or about one-half of them, to be phyally unfit for full service in the field. e disabilities were not the result of active ease, but evidently in most cases the conquence of poor nutrition, neglect of pernal hygiene and insanitary conditions of orking and living.
