fervice, and your once powerful army is now wasted away.

The necessity for your return must, I think, by this time have very fully appeared. But even if no fuch necessity had existed, you received orders to return; and if disobedience to the orders of that Sovereign, whose commission you bear, and to whose bounty you are so much indebted, can be justified in a military light, I confess I am ignorant of the mode of justification. You attempt to prove that the order was conditional, and the condition depending upon your own judgment. It is true, your orders were to proceed to Boston as soon as it could be done without any material risk to your health. They who have affociated with you in private, who have feen and heard you in public, will determine whether you was not in a condition to obey even the tenor, much more the purport of this order. But, besides the persuasion which you entertained, that " to expose your constitution to the next American winter was in all probability to doom you to the grave," you assign another reason for not returning to America.
