Nine months ago this day I addressed a long letter to you in which I bestowed upon you as I then, and now think some merited encomiums respecting your abilities and conduct in former days. I also with as much frankness in the same letter expressed my pointed disaprobation against your detestable and deleterious conduct while at the head of the North Western army in upper Canada, and at Fort Detroit in our late war with Great Britian.

At the time I sent the letter to you, I entertained a strong hope and had some expectation that I should receive an answer to my letter, from you, but alas! those expectations have long ago been at an end.—Therefore I take this method to inform you, sir, that I have now in my possession the original letter in my own hand writing, from which, the letter I sent to you was copied, and that I have, at divers times and by divers persons, been importuned to have said letter printed.
