WINNIPEG, Nov. 14.—A crop report published here to-day states that 75 per cent, threshing has been done in Manitoba 50 per cent in Saskatchewan, 75 per cent in Southern Alberta, and 35 tol 40 per cent in Northern Alberta.

The department of agriculture for the Province of Saskatchewan estimates the amount of grain unthreshed at the present date at 27 per cent, and of this quality fully 18 per cent, will remain in stook over winter.

The weather is very cold. It has been much colder in Saskatchewan and Alberta than in Manitoba. Forecast: Local snow falls or flurries, scattered, but generally far and continued very cold to-day and Wednesday.
