Business Houses Send Letters A Near Fist Pight Between Rhode Islanders Enlivened by Express for Delivery as "Drop" Letters in Out-Proceedings—Setback for Hearst. side Places.

BALTIMORE, June 24.—(Can. Press.) "It was that he must accept the nomination from the convention as then composed, and not insist upon removal of the seventy-eight delegates who, he contended, were fraudulent, before he would recognize any act of the convention. Roosevelt said that a considerable number of signatures to the pledge were obtained, but that it had proved impossible to held a sufficiently large part of the delegates in line for the course of action upon which he insisted to give it the chance of success.
