Of that total, \$15,532,300 represented lard; tallow, oleo oil and oleoma; garine, with lard, made a total of \$23,628,800, leaving less than \$2,000,000 to represent our sales of products classed as meats. Small as our sales of pork have been to Germany under the old tariff; the new tariff, which becomes effective next year, will make them very much smaller—will practically wipe them out entirely—unless some reciprocal arrangement with Germany is made in the meantime.


