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TUPPER AT QUEBEC

The Premier Speaks to a Great Gathering

NO PROMISE TO BUILD A BRIDGE

Government Will Back It if the Railways are Willing

Sir Charles Explains What the Conservative

Party Has Done in the Way of Building Up the Dominion

Quebec, May 18.—Sir Charles Tupper

was presented with an address by the Quebec Board of Trade

at noon today

and in answer to the address Sir Charles reviewed the increase of trade in Canada since 1854

Quebec, which has been a sufferer by the loss of the ship-building

and timber trade, now bids fair for a revival of business and industries

with a fast line of steamers, the dead meat trade and cold storage exportation system

Sir Charles declared that he had never promised to build a bridge across the St. Lawrence, but he said if the railway companies were willing to have it they would be backed by the Government

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Two Presbyterian Pastors Go Into Politics.

ONE DENOUNCES CONSERVATIVES

Another Says Let the Catholic Church Pay the Piper.

Rev. Joseph Hogg Says the Roman Catholics Were Not Guaranteed Separate Schools in Manitoba—Mr. Spiers, the Liberal Candidate in Brandon, Resigns in Favor of Mr. McCarthy—The Greenway Organ Wants All Members Candidates Fined to Oppose Remedial Legislation—Opposition to La Riviere.

Winipeg, May 18.—(Special)—Rev. J. Hogg, a Presbyterian pastor here, in his sermon yesterday, said: "The Roman Catholics were not guaranteed Separate Schools. The words to that effect in the Bill of Rights were evidently written by some wicked hand, after the bill was sent from Winnipeg to Ottawa. Let Roman Catholics understand they may ride in the chariot of this country's progress, but they cannot hold the reins or drive. If Catholics want Separate schools they must pay for them. If the Roman Catholic Church wants to dance, she must pay the piper."

Rev. John Hogg, another Presbyterian pastor, went to starting extremes, denouncing in his sermon the Conservative Government as debauchers of the electors, a nest of conspiring corruptionists, whose misgovernment of a free and Christian people rested on the land like a blighting curse. This preacher's utterances were beyond all limits, approaching a stage of hysteria.

Mr. Spiers Favors Mr. McCarthy. A despatch from Brandon to-night says: "Mr. Spiers, the Liberal candidate, has withdrawn from the contest, and has thrown his weight in with Mr. McCarthy. This action, the part of Mr. Spiers is resented by a large number of Liberals, who propose to have a candidate of their own in the field."

Discussing the bishops' mandement editorially, The Tribune to-night says: "Surely, if all the small churches are asked by the Roman Catholic Church to pledge themselves to support Remedial Legislation, the candidates in Manitoba, which to be correct should be all pledged to oppose it, no matter what their political complexion may be. Scores of Conservative candidates in Ontario and other English speaking provinces are pledging themselves against coercion, and yet Manitoba candidates are silent. Degradation could scarcely go further than the election of Government candidates unpledged to oppose the coercion of Manitoba."

To Oppose Mr. La Riviere. The Liberals of the province here are eager to get a candidate against Mr. La Riviere, and have forwarded a request to Mr. Laurier that he be their candidate.

BURIAL OF THE SUICIDE. Three Thousand Persons at the Grave of F. L. Gray in Johannesburg. Johannesburg, May 18.—The funeral of F. L. Gray, one of the recently sentenced members of the Reform Committee, who became insane and committed suicide in jail at Pretoria, a few days ago, took place here yesterday and was largely attended, some 3000 persons being present at the graveyard. The Rev. J. G. Barnard, the "Kaffir King," officiated at the funeral in the presence of the cemetery.
