FORTY CORPSES IN A WEEK

Horrors of the Klondike Have Not Been Told by Correspondents.

Mr. E. B. Hamlin, C. E., and His Companion Were Victims of the Greed for Gold—Many Going in Will Never Return and Others May Get Back Only to Be Buried on the Country—Uncle Sam Will Get the Most Gold.

The following is an extract from a letter received by Mr. David Henderson, barrister, from a friend in Victoria, B. C.:

"We are beginning to see the horrors of the Klondike, but the reports are not printed. A Seattle steamer brought down 40 corpses last week and on Saturday last a Victorian came from Dawson bringing news of the death of two men in the Yukon. I have not seen the reports of L. B. Hamlin, C. E., and his companion. He is a neighbor of ours, and left home last October upon Government work. His wife, Mrs. Hamlin, is now in the Yukon, and is very anxious to get home."

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ONTARIO'S EDUCATIONISTS.

First Day of the 37th Annual Meeting of the Association.

Concise Account of the Proceedings—Treated in Sections with Epitome of All the Papers and Addresses—Brilliant Reception by the Lieutenant-Governor in the Evening.

Nearly three hundred of Ontario's teachers flocked to the Education Department in St. James-square yesterday morning.

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Republican Members of the Foreign Affairs Committee So Decide.

Every Point Was Considered Fully Before the Decision Was Reached—The Resolution Will Pass the House Before the Sun Sets To-Day, Giving Authority to the President to Intervene by Armed Force to Secure Peace in Cuba.

Washington, D. C., April 12.—"The President is authorized, directed and empowered to intervene at once to restore peace on the island of Cuba and secure to the people thereof a firm, stable and independent Government of their own, and is authorized to use the army and navy forces of the United States to secure the end."

This substantially is the resolution agreed upon by the Republican members of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House to-night.

The meeting was held at the residence of one of the members and did not adjourn till a very late hour.

Before finally deciding upon the wording of the resolution as given above, the committee carefully considered several other proposals.

Information was conveyed to the committee, however, that a strong resolution was demanded and several members, headed by Mr. Smith of Michigan, made the content for the resolution that was finally agreed upon.

It is now the purpose to pass the resolution before the sun sets to-morrow. Debate will be limited to four or five hours. The House leaders have determined upon this course in the belief that it will strengthen both at home and abroad the position of the United States.

It is said that, if necessary, a continuous sitting will be had in the Senate in order to secure final action during the legislative day of Wednesday.

SITUATION CONSIDERED GRAVE.

Madrid, April 12 (7:40 p.m.).—The Ministers have been in Cabinet session to-day.

THE COAST IS NOW CLEAR For Construction of a Railway to the Yukon Country.

Any Reliable Syndicate May Go Ahead and Build a Line on Compliance With Certain Conditions—The Line Can Be Completed This Year—Wednesday and Thursday Taken by the Government—Other Ottawa News.

Ottawa, April 12.—(Special.)—Advices from Washington indicate that the coast is clear for the construction of a Yukon railway in the disputed territory at the head of the Lynn Canal, either by way of the White Chilkoot or Chilkat Passes.

A general inquiry into the matter, and any reliable syndicate, on compliance with the conditions laid down in the act, can go to work to construct the railway.

Half a dozen companies were struggling for the concessions, but the Government has decided to build a line from Grand Harbor to the international boundary crossing the Dalton Trail, a distance of about 60 miles, but to settle their differences and then come to him. This the latter party has refused to do.
