FIERY SPEECH BY TILLMAN.

Believes in Killing Negroes When They Enroach on South.

Washington, May 7.—In the Senate today Senator Tillman pleaded for liberty for Filipinos. Senator Tillman said that if it had been known in the South that the reins of government were to be given to the negroes the civil war would have been prolonged indefinitely. He insisted that in order to maintain their self-respect the white people of the South had been obliged to subdue the negro by whatever means they could. "When we get ready to put a nigger's face in the sand," he shouted, "we put his body there, too!" He declared that the people of the South would never submit to negro domination, and he hoped Republican senators would turn from their "game of devility in the Philippines," and assist the South to rid itself of the threat of negro domination. While Mr. Tillman was speaking many of the Democratic senators left the chamber.

AIMS TO INJURE CANADA

could gather there was nothing objectionable in Mr. MacLaren's motion, but being submitted as an amendment to the put on record, so that the people could thoroughly understand the importance of the question.

Mr. Fisher went on to say that the difference between Canada and the United States in freight rates to Europe was not due to the difference in cost of transportation by land, but to the higher steamship rates from Canadian than from American ports.

This was chiefly due to the higher insurance rates on the St. Lawrence route. The sum \$250,000 was to be spent in improving the aids to navigation on the St. Lawrence, and the result, he hoped, would be to lower those rates. As for the charge of discrimination by the railways, Mr. Fisher thought this would be remedied by the Railway Commission. He was surprised that Canadian owners had not established a line of freight steamers, to do business on our waterways between the Great Lakes and Montreal.

Railways Discriminate.
Jabel Robinson declared the subject was the most important one that has been discussed this session. To prove that the railways discriminated against Canadian freight, he produced two shipping bills from the same railway company. One was a bill of lading for 100 pounds of live cattle from Chicago to Boston. The other was a bill of lading for 100 pounds of live cattle from a point 50 miles north of Toronto, to Boston. The difference in the rates was \$1.14 per hundred pounds, so that there was a discrimination of \$1.14 per hundred pounds of freight.

Serious for Canada.
Mr. Tarte said that, while it was too early in the day to say what was to be the effect of the Morgan steamship amalgamation, yet, for himself, he believed it was a serious proposition for Canada to face, but he did not despair. We were not so poor that we could not provide for our own needs. The reason the Canadian waterways were not used to a greater extent was that we had no port at the entrance to the Welland Canal, which a big steamship could unload. He was providing that facility at Port Colborne. The canal system would be completed next year, and he would ask the leaders of both parties to the House to respect his work. He regretted that the procedure would not allow the government to accept the motion, but he hoped the member for having given the government the benefit of his great practical knowledge and his ability, as applied to this question.

Georgian Bay Canal.
Thomas Murray (Lib. Ontario) said that the facts and predictions as to the great production of grain in the West were strong arguments in favor of constructing the Georgian Bay Canal. He was disappointed that the estimate should be placed at \$10,000,000, and that the estimate for the deepening of the French River route, and completing a navigation route to the north, was a divergence of opinions as to how the canal should be constructed, he was himself in favor of the government building it, as it would be a national asset, and an important part of Canada's future.

E. P. Clarke spoke in favor of the route, and said to show how seriously insurance rates were discriminated against the St. Lawrence route. Mr. Kemp, in his address, had supported the resolution, as did also Mr. Bell of Picton and Dr. Reid of St. Catharines.

Large New Vessels.
Mr. Tarte, replying to a question by Dr. Reid, said that large new vessels for inland traffic were being constructed in Canada, to which Dr. Reid replied that, at that rate, he had no fear of the effect on Canadian commerce of the Morgan Steamship Trust.

The resolution was then put to a vote, which, in view of the refusal of the government to accept it, was thus made a party issue, and so the motion of the Cheese King was voted down by 33 to 43.

STAMP OUT ANARCHY.
Police Chiefs in Annual Convention at Louisville Urged to It.

Louisville, Ky., May 7.—The ninth annual convention of the Association of Police Chiefs of the United States and Canada was called to order here today by Mayor Chas. W. Granger. About 225 delegates were in attendance. Chief Richard Sylvester of Washington, D.C., presided.

The annual report, under the necessity of the police chiefs taking steps to stamp out anarchy, was the subject of much discussion. It was also decided to organize an international organization of all countries should unite in this movement.
