CHANCELLOR'S SWAN SONG SPEECH

T. P. O'Connor Regrets It Should Be Against Ireland. London, July 25.—In the House of Commons to-day Irish matters came up again. A mention of John J. Clancy (Irish Nationalist), to the effect that the over-taxation of Ireland constitutes a pressing grievance, was defeated by 168 to 117, after a number of Irish Nationalists had spoken and been replied to by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach. The Chancellor said Ireland's share in Imperial taxation was decreasing rather than increasing, and that it was the fattest system which could at present be devised.

The bylaw against bicycle riding on sidewalks was amended, by adding costs to the penalties already provided therein. By-laws for the collection of special and general taxes were passed, the dates of payment being Oct. 15 and Dec. 15.

For prompt payment before the first date, a discount of 5 per cent, will be allowed.
